THE GREAT PLANER THAT WILL DO THE WORK OF MANY MEN.

Above is a cut of the stone planer that has so stirred up the stone cutters of this city. It will handle a stone six feet eight inches wide, twelve feet long, and three feet one inch high, and the contractor says it will do the work of ten men. He, denies that the use of the planer in Chicago was the means of a break from stone for fronts to terra cotta, or that it is ruining the stone cutter's trade, for terra cotta was put into use in Chicago before the stone planer was made use of there. The contractor claims that terra cotia was substituted for stone because the former is so much lighter than stone, and can be fastened easier to the steel skeletons of the great buildings. He claims that if the planer injured stope, eastern architects would soon put it out of commission.

Two members of the stone cutters' union of this city called at the "News" office yesterday, to further state their case in the matter of the planer. They were Messrs. Clark and Priday, who averred that if the planer was allowed to get into service here, every stone cutter might as well leave town, for it would mean the ruination of their business. They claimed the statement that the planer took the "life" out of the stone to the depth of an inch, to be strictly true, and that stone fronts in Chicago are showing it today. That the machine will do itawork beautifully, and with precision, ease, neatness and dispatch, the stone cutters do not deny. But the damage to the stone, they claim, more than offsets the gain. They remark that in the case of sawn stone, and in fact in hand cutting, there is a slight injury done the stone. But in this case, the depth affected is slight and is worn off in the subsequent rubbing and polishing. If this could be done to stone after the rock planer had gone over it, it would be all right. But the damage, they say, extends in one inch, so deep, that no amount of rubbing or polishing can remove all of the injured surfaces. The stone cutters say they will take the matter before the Commercial club, and government officials, and see if the planer may not be staved off. At the same time, the Federal building confractors are setting the great machine up, and in a few days will have it running, driven by an electric motor . . AN FAIL A.
