REGISTRARS FOR FALL ELECTION

They Have Been Appointed by
The Board of Com-
missioners.

TWO DISTRICTS NOT NAMED.

Majority of Those Selected Are Re-
publicans—"Americans" Got None
At All—A Few Democrats.

The county commissioners met yesterday afternoon and appointed registrars for the coming fall election in this county. There are two districts in which registrars were not named yesterday, but they will be named before the first day of registration. They are the seventy-second and eightieth. In order to use the new voting machines, the number of voting districts in the city were reduced some time ago from 53 to 41, but the numbers of the county districts remain the same as before. A very large majority of the registrars named yesterday are Republicans, as they were appointed upon a basis of the last county election which went strongly Republican. The Democrats get a few registrars but the "Americans" got none at all. The days for registration this year are Aug. 13, 21, and 23, Oct. 2, 9, 16 and 20.
