AFTER HEALTH OFFICERS.

State Board Proposes to Make it Warm For County Officials.

The state board of health is getting after local health officials over the state who take their own good time in which to make reports as to local conditions; and the following circular has been prepared by Secy. Beatty for circulation among all health officers in the state:

"The attention of health officers is called to section 1107, Revised Statutes of Utah, 1896, as amended by chapter 102, laws of Utah, 1903, which provides a penalty for failure to make reports and perform the other duties of health officers, and for their removal from office for the same cause; also an amend-ment to section 1108 passed by the last Legislature viz: 'It shall be the duty of the local health officer to make a monthly report to the state boarl of health, on or before the fifth day of each month, of all cases of scarlet fever, smallpox, diphtheria, membranous croup, typhoid fever, whooping cough, measles, chicken pox, pneumonia and tuberculosis, which have occurred within his jurisdiction during the previ-

ous month. "Owing to the continued failure of certain health officers in the state to make regular reports in compliance with the law, it has become the duty of the state board of health to enforce the above sections, and notice is here-by given that this action will be taken in case of future delinquencies, unless a reasonable excuse shall be furnished for same. It is sincerely hoped that the board may be spared this disagree-

duty. "We appreciate the fact that in many nstances health officers receive insuf-lcient remuneration, and we are makng an earnest endeavor to secure a nore substantial recognition of thei services and the responsibility of their office. At the same time, if they ac-cept the position, they owe it to them-selves and to the public to faithfully perform the duties of the same as

as they continue to serve "May we not hope that there may a renewed interest in this important life-saving work in which we are all engaged, and that each and every health officer may hereafter voluntar-

ily contribute his best efforts to the performance of his duties."
