

Proceedings of Utah County Probate Court.

We have been furnished by J. W. Cumming, Esq., Clerk of the Probate Court for Utah county, with a brief summary of the proceedings of said court, at the March session held at Provo, commencing on the 11th ult., and continuing till the 21st, when an adjournment was taken till Monday the 15th inst at 10 a.m.

Judging from the number of indictments found by the grand jury, there must have been some inquiry made into the acts of certain alleged beef traders who have infested that county, as well as other parts of the Territory, during the last few years. The names of the persons indicted have not transpired, as they have not all been arrested, and if the officers find one half of the accused, they will doubtless have to go to Pike's Peak, New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, or elsewhere after them, which of course they will not do, as the absence of such beings from the Territory, if perpetual, is all that is desired, even by those who have suffered most from their thieving operations. During the sitting of the Court four persons were tried on indictments for larceny, three of whom were found guilty, and fined two hundred dollars each and costs; the other was acquitted. Four unlucky wights indicted for riot, on being arraigned plead guilty, and were fined ten dollars each and costs. A matrimonial alliance, existing between an unhappy couple, was dissolved, and a few civil cases were up for consideration, and were either adjudicated, dismissed, withdrawn or continued.

The adjourned session on the 15th inst, will unquestionably be quite interesting, and if those who are expected to be put on trial for unlawfully dealing in beef, should be found guilty, and dealt with by "the Court and jury" as thoroughly as were those that were recently tried, Utah county will soon be enabled to build a fine Court House and Jail, which are much needed wherever transgressors of the laws are found to exist in considerable numbers, especially if they are brought to judgment promptly for the felonious acts by them committed, which seems to be the intention of the officers of justice in Utah county.

Visit from the Utes.

The Utah Chief, Peteetneet, who has become the leader or principal chief of his band, since the death of Arapeen, accompanied by Sanpitch and some twenty other Indians of their tribe, came into the city on Friday last, to see the Superintendent; get some presents etc., and remained hereabouts two or three days. Col. Davies is reported to have received them very kindly, and gave them blankets and many other presents, with which they were highly pleased. The chiefs dined with him once or twice and went away very favorably impressed with his demeanor and generous treatment to them and their braves.

After donning their new blankets, they walked about the streets quite majestically, and when they took their departure for their mountain haunts, they felt much better than they would if they had been treated as savages too often are, by government representatives.

HEAVY RAIN STORMS.—From Wednesday morning till Thursday evening last it rained almost constantly; much of the time very fast, soaking the ground thoroughly. A more beautiful rain, at this season of the year, has seldom been seen in these valleys, though it was rather cool and blustering on Thursday. During Wednesday night the storm was attended with several peals of thunder.

There was another rushing storm on Friday night, attended with thunder and hail. The wind from the north-west blew violently and the rain descended copiously for several hours.

It was raining most of the time yesterday, and when we went to press in the evening, there was a fair prospect for a long storm.

Look Out.—These persons having animals on the Jordan range, in this county, that are subject to forfeiture, when found running at large, will do well to see after them shortly, as we understand there will be a gathering up of all such stock, in the course of a few days, for the purpose of disposing of it as provided for by law. Persons injured by studs and ridgils running on said range are determined to avail themselves of the privilege guaranteed by the statutes.
