temporary flooring, which had been

New York, 22.—At a meeting

in King's County, Supervisor John

W. Jones, presiding, a resolution

was adopted, to the effect that

\$288,883 was expended on the peni-

tentiary in 1868, 1869, and 1870,

which was \$200,000 more than the

law authorized. Among the items

was one of \$30,000 for work done

of which no trace was found.

Bonded amounting to \$10,000, al-

leged to have been purchased by

Geo. McDonald out of part of the

proceeds of the Bank of England

loans, were found in the State

field, Mass., on Tuesday, and are

to be attached on their arrival in

this city and detained pending the

decision of Commissioner Gutman,

who has charge of the examination

of McDonald.

WASHINGTON, 22.—The following

proclamation was issued by the

President to-day:

Whereas, under the pretence that

Wm. P. Kellogg, the present ex-

ecutive of La., and the officers as-

sociated with him in the State ad-

ministration were not duly elected;

certain turbulent and disorderly

persons have taken possession of

the State, and are endeavoring to

resist the laws and constituted au-

thorities of said State;

Whereas, it has been duly

certified by the proper local au-

thorities, and judicially deter-

mined by the United States

Court, that the same officers

are elected to hold their offices

respectively, and to execute and

discharge the functions thereof;

Whereas, Congress, at its late

session, upon due consideration

of that subject, has recognized

the said executive and his asso-

ciates, and has in this manner

expressed its confidence in them;

Whereas, it is provided in

the constitution of the U. S. that

the executive power shall be

vested in the President of the

United States; and

Whereas, it is the duty of the

President to see that the laws

are faithfully executed;

Therefore, I, Abraham Lincoln,

President of the United States,

do hereby make proclamation,

calling upon the said executive

and his associates to discontinue

their resistance to the laws of

the United States, and to return

to their respective homes, and

to obey the laws of the United

States; and

Whereas, it is the duty of the

President to see that the laws

are faithfully executed;

Therefore, I, Abraham Lincoln,

President of the United States,

do hereby make proclamation,

calling upon the said executive

and his associates to discontinue

their resistance to the laws of

the United States, and to return

to their respective homes, and

to obey the laws of the United

States; and

Whereas, it is the duty of the

President to see that the laws

are faithfully executed;

Therefore, I, Abraham Lincoln,

President of the United States,

do hereby make proclamation,

calling upon the said executive

and his associates to discontinue

their resistance to the laws of

the United States, and to return

to their respective homes, and

expects to have his company full

by Saturday. He has, by authority

of Gen. Scofield, made arrange-

ments for the removal of all scat-

tering Indians to the military re-

servation at Ft. Jones, to be re-

ferred by the Government until the

war is over. He has appointed the

following gentlemen as a com-

mittee to see that all is conducted

fairly: E. Steele, Ex-Senator Wade

worth, Judge A. M. Rosebrough,

Senator W. Irwin, and Judge E.

Shearer. Mr. Steele held a council

with Shai, near the town this p.

m., and they agreed to go to Ft.

Jones, and sent a message to the

upper Sacramento Indians to come

and meet Mr. Steele in council.
