DOUBLE TRAGEDY

ON SECOND SOUTH

Murder and Suicide Committed

In a Rooming House

Last Night.

EDGAR BOWMAN KILLS WIFE

Then Turns Revolver on Himself and

Blows Out His Brains Before

Several Witnesses.

A murder and suicide was com-

mitted at 11 o'clock last night in a

roominghouse at 64 west Second South

street, by Edgar Bowman, a boilermak-

er from Los Angeles. Angered be

cause his young and pretty wife refused

to live with him longer and suffer from

his brutality, and because she was

taking steps to secure a divorce from him, Bowman shot her and then plac-

ing the weapon to his own head blew out his brains. Bowman died instant-ly, but the young woman ingered at St. Mark's hospital until shortly after 3

o'clock this morning when death ended

be clock this morning when death ended her sufferings. The body of the murderer and sui-cide is at O'Donnell's undertaking par-lors while the body of the woman is at Hell's

at Hall's. That Bowman had planned to mur

at Hairs. That Bowman had planned to mur-der his wife and then kill himself is evident from the circumstances. About three hours before the crime was com-mitted he borrowed \$3 from John Evs. and with the money purchased the re-volver. Bowman fired two shots at his wife but the first went wild, being di-verted by Frank J. Adamson, who sprang upon the man as he drew the weapon. The second shot, however, struck Mrs. Bowman in the left breast just above the heart. With a moan th-woman sank to the floor. The enraged man then turned the revolver upon himself. He fired two shots, one going into the wall while the other crashed through his brain. He was instantly killed.

TAKEN TO HOSPITAL.

Mrs. Bowman was hurriedly taken to the emergency hospital at police head-quarters and Police Srugeon S. G. Paul summoned. After making an examina-tion of the wound Dr. Paul decided to send the unfortunate woman to St. Mark's hospital. He stated at the time that her chances for recovery were de-cidedly slim. She was taken to the hos-pital about 1 o'clock and lived a little over two hours.

Bowman and his wife were married in Los Angeles about three years ago. She was the daughter of former Detec-tive E. A. Franks and Mrs. John Eva, who was dioviced from Franks several years ago.

She was making preparations to secure a divorce and Bowman learned of her intentions. He wrote to her several times and tried to induce the young wife to return to him, but she refused. Ten days ago Bowman arrived from Los Angeles and finally persuaded his wife to promise to return to Los An-Mrs. Mary I. Newton is not guilty of the charge of stealing a purse containing 51 dimes and two nickels from Mrs. Mary I. Erickson, according to the decision of Judge Diehl in the police court.

Los Angeles and finally persuaded his wife to promise to return to Los An-geles with him. He promised to stop drinking and said he would treat her better. A week ago he asked her to go with him to Bingham Junction to visit her grandmother, but she did not want to go, and her refusal angered Bowman, and he made threats to kill her. She told her father of the threats and he advised her to secure a di-vorce as soon as possible and to keep away from the man. Bowman learned of this and began drinking heavily. From the evidence it appears that From the evidence it appears that Mrs. Newton was attempting to help the Ericksons in the purse disap-peared, and work of a crowd that gathered around after Mr. Erick-son had wounded himself by pricking his eye, which bled freely. Mrs. New-ton, with others in the Elko hotel, where the affair took place, was at-tracted to the Ericksons by the bleed-ing face of the man, and as soon as she found what was the trouble, announced that she was a professional nurse, and e was a profe ional nurse, and then departed for the kitchen after hot water and cloths. The only evidence the Ericksons had that it was she who took the purse was the fact that she had left the crowd. The Ericksons had come to Sait Lake to attend the thea-ter, and after it was over Mr. Erickson at the Elko hotel, had tried to apply a leach to his eye, pricking it in the process. District Court Holds That State Law is

A Bad One.

That the seventh legislature of the State of Utah indulged in at least one case of vicious class legislation is the opinion of Judge Lewis of the Third district court, who holds to be uncon-stitutional the law relating to the examination of veterinary surgeons and dentists, and the use of titles by these practitioners, setting forth their occupation

The decision is handed down in pass-ing upon a demurrer of Dr. J. B. Sim-mons, who styles himself in his adver-tising: "Veterinary surgeon and dent-ist," and who appealed his case to the district court after being fined in a batteries court for not complying with justice's court for not complying with

According to the decision any man who wishes to practise dental surgery can do so, and any man who wishes to become a veterinary surgeon can do so regardless of the state's examining

regardless of the state's examining board and the state's supervision. Dr. Simimons was found practising without a certificate from the board of examiners, was duly arrested and as duly fixed \$1. He appealed and at-tacked the constitutionality of the act. One clause in the law provides that the veterinary must not use any fille that may be conferred by a school in veterinary science, and reads as fol-lows:

lows: "Nothing in this act shall pervent any person from practising veterinary medicine, surgery or dentistry, provia-ed such persons do not use the title 'veterinary surgeon,' or 'veterinary dentist,' or any analogous title or any degree, or part thereof conferred by any legally chartered veterinary school or agricultural college." Judge Lewis, in considering the con-stitutionality of the act, says: "I am of the opinion that the leg-islature has attempted to confer upon college graduates the exclusive use of

stature has attempted to conter upon college graduates the exclusive use of the words, 'veterinary surgeon,' and 'veterinary surgeon,' and 'veterinary dentiet,' it is beyond the power of the legisla-ture so to do, it being class legislation of the most vicious sort. The de-murrer is sustained."

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
