Beet Sugar Authority Says Insurrection Has Caused Advance.

CROP OUTLOOK UNCERTAIN.

Labor is Next to Impossible to Obtain in Cuba and the Sugar Sitnation Demoralized.

Whether free trads or protection prevails in any country, says the Beet Sugar Gazette, the entire inhabited globe is sensible to movements in the world's economics. All occurrences which touch either conditions of productions or fields of sale, be it ever so remotely, have their bearings upon the markets of the world. Thus, it is a matter of course that the Cuban revolution has found its appreciative attention in the sugar markets. In Europe the price of cane sugar rose within a very few days after the outbreak about 5 per cent on the principal markets, and is still

advancing. Under date of August 27, the Gazette correspondent in Cuba writes: Sugar news is scarce in Cuba these days unless everything connected with the present revolution is sugar news And everything connected with the revolution certainly does have more or less bearing upon this important industry. The sugar planters at the present time are looking upon the situation with most doleful contemplation. They see nothing hopeful in the outlook. Visions of the ruins of their handsome plantations as occurred in the last insurrec-tion are before them constantly. Or-ders for new and modern machinery have been stopped by cable. Others who have machinery in the custom house have had it stored in warehousen house have had it stored in warehouses in this city because they fear that if they take it out to their plantations the fire and the sword may once again be king in Cuba and the valuable machin-

be ruined. ery It is a frequent thing to hear it said that no matter what the loss, the United States must pay it because of the Platt amendment, but the exper-ienced and far-seeing planter gets litthe comfort in such a promise. He has experienced in regard to how the Unit-ed States pays damages. Even if the rebels did not commence

their old tricks of burning everything of value, as they did under the Spanish regime, the amount of damage to the sugar interests will be incalculable. Labor was hard to secure last year, but let a revolution be in full swing on the island and it will be next to impossible to obtain any labor. A planter may be working tow or three hundred hands when a revolutionary band may appear and take every ox or horse he has, and at the same time compel all of the laborers on the plantation to join their party.
