A German Preacher Writes from This City to a Pastor in Germany.

HIS SHAMEFUL FALSEHOODS.

Enblashing Misrepresentations That Bring Forth a Vigorous Protest and Refutation from German Residents.

A letter purporting to have been written from Salt Lake City by one Zimmer, claiming to be pastor of a German church here, having been published in a number of German and Swiss papers, inquiries were made of German residents of Utah concerning the astonish. ing and libellous statements therein contained. The German Saints have become highly indignant at the course of the writer of the letter and have prepared a reply which has been signed by about 250 reputable persons, for publieation in Europe. We here reproduce in English Zimmer's scandalous letter and also the reply, both of which have been translated for the "News."

COMPLETELY DESTROYED. Only Contents of the Residence Were Saved from Fire on Cannon Farm.

Report of City Institutions Shows a Total Enrollment of 12,692 Pupils.

The report of the city schools for the fourth month of the school year ending Jan. 8, 1904, shows a total enrollment of 12,692 pupils. There were 1,823 cases of tardiness in all the schools during the month and the average per cent of punctuality was 99.4 per cent. There were 28 cases of truancy and six of corporal punishment during the month. There are 45 colored children enrolled in the public schools of the city at the present time.

I will give you the following mample of how cheap some of our peo-

ple are hired In one of the largest furniture houses in Salt Lake City, owned by H- D-ia Mormon in every sense of the word, who has four wives), many Germans tre employed, particularly the newtomers, and newest converts, but be-bind this apparent love for his fellow man there is hidden another object in imploying our emigrants. To any other American employe Mr. D- would have to pay from \$2.00 to \$3.00 a day, have to pay from \$2.00 to \$3.00 a day, bat when he employes these "green Bermans" (as they are called here) he pays them only 75c to \$1.50 a day. In this way Mr. D— makes a profit on Wery man of from \$1.00 to \$1.50. This mount of from \$1.00 to \$1.50. imounts to a considerable sum during the year, sufficient for this "Mormon" to feed his four wives; but that is not all that Mr, D- gets from his laborers, Suposing a man earns the big round sum of \$10 per week Mr. D- pays him only \$5 in each, the remaining \$2 is paid to him in tithing money. When the laborer wants to use this tithing money, which can only be used in the leading "Morinon" stores, he will find dollar. The laborer, however, is not permitted to say one word about this, for every "Mormon" is compelled to with the rule of the Church and those placed over them. The 25 per cent which the laborer loses is a het profit to the employer, which he receives at the tithing treasury in Zion. Were it r Were it not so, the employer would not give his laborers this tithing money, but as the Church owns in every ward i Salt Lake City a large store, the mployers sustain these business mployers sustain these business ouses.
