

NO RESTRICTIONS ON EXTRA SESSION

When Congress Meets March 15
It Can Take Up Any Business
It May Choose To.

TARIFF REVISION IS FIRST.

Generally Conceded That a Couple of
Months Will be Necessary to
Dispose of Schedules.

Washington, March 7.—When Congress meets March 15 to consider tariff revision there will be no constitutional restrictions upon the nature of business that may be transacted. It is generally conceded that at least two months will be required for the house to conclude consideration of all the schedules involved in this legislation. The house itself will not receive the bill for some weeks, as the committee on ways and means will require considerable time to report the measure. During this period the senate will have nothing to do in respect to the tariff, and even after the bill leaves the house it will be in the hands of the committee on finance for some time before the senate actually gets possession of it. Then will begin a long wait by the senate until the senate amendment can be known and conference appointed to bring about an agreement upon them.

This procedure will result in each house having to remain in session until after a period of a couple of months. Three days is the extent of a recess that may be taken by either body.

Senators, therefore, are considering the advisability of entering upon other legislation. The advocates of postal savings banks have talked of the possibility of such a policy being adopted ever since they became aware of their inability to secure legislation in the senate.

There are many earnest advocates of a change of date in the inauguration of March 4, and action on this question may be taken.

Advocates of staidness for New Mexico and Arizona were greatly disappointed that no progress could be made toward the enactment of an enabling act during the late session, and they are restless to see any legislation to delay action until the regular session of Congress, because they fear the mass of legislation which will then come up will crowd out their claims.

The president's veto of the census bill, mandating some action to provide for the enumeration of the thirteenth census. Legislation might be delayed until early next winter, but some believe that the extra session to dispose of it.

The extra session is sure to bring forth a deluge of bills in both houses.

WANTS FELLOWSHIP WITH UNITARIAN CONFERENCE

Chicago, March 5.—The N. J. Rubinkam association on its sixth anniversary has applied for fellowship in the Western Unitarian conference. The society has been known as the Central Unitarian society of Chicago, with Dr. Rubinkam as its minister and pastor.

The application is signed March 4, the day of the inauguration of President Taft, himself a Unitarian.

"Today theological creeds are giving way, or are subject to the larger fellowship of all believing people," said the lecturer in explaining the society's action.

"This is not that there are less individual opinions and faiths, political and religious, but it is that there is a larger vision of life and personal ideas and interests are given their right perspective."

Dr. Rubinkam began his ministry in the Presbyterian church. Later he was affiliated with the Dutch Reformed church. He came to Chicago in 1892 and built University Congregational church of which he was pastor for several years.

ROBERT EMMET.

Two Celebrations Commemorative of His Birth Held in New York.

New York, March 5.—Two celebrations commemorative of the one hundred and thirty-first anniversary of the birth of Robert Emmet were held in this city last night. The United Irish league had a meeting at the Lyric theater and the Clan-na-Gael gathered at the Herald Square theater. Michael J. Ryan of Philadelphia, president of the United Irish league of America, said during the course of an address at the league celebration:

John E. Redmond has done more to advance the political, material, intellectual and industrial interests of Ireland than any other man in the last century. Never since the day of Emmet has the future of Ireland looked brighter with the promise of victory than it does today under the leadership of Redmond. He represents an Ireland united to an extent unparalleled in all her checked history, and he is the unquestioned leader of an organization that has done much for the cause of Irish freedom. If Redmond would today forget the cause for which Ireland is fighting he would become the prime minister of England. Intellectually he is the most powerful man in all of the British empire and he is devoting all his talents with which he has been endowed to carrying on the work which was begun by Robert Emmet more than a hundred years ago.

Senatorial Toga, Says
Senator T. C. Platt.

ROOSEVELT OUT OF POLITICS.

Platt Thinks That the ex-President
Will Never be Heard from
Politically Hereafter.

New York, March 7.—Elihu Root will be the Republican leader of New York, according to a published interview credited to former Senator T. C. Platt, who has just returned from Washington.

Elihu Root will head the Republican organization because of donning the senatorial toga. Mr. Platt is quoted as saying: "His powers are only less than those of the president and he and President Taft are on close terms."

When Mr. Platt was asked whether Mr. Roosevelt's appointment did not indicate that Theodore Roosevelt planned to control the Republican politics in the state on his return from the African hunting trip, he said:

"Any man who goes to Africa for a year cannot expect to keep his hold in a political way. I believe Mr. Roosevelt purposes to retire permanently from the field of political endeavor. Mr. Roosevelt will not be heard from politically hereafter."

PLATT'S PLANS.

New York, March 5.—Now that ex-Senator Thomas C. Platt is out of the United States senate he expects to go to Washington only occasionally. In the course of an interview last night in which he declared it is his opinion that Elihu Root would be the future political leader of this state, he said:

"I am going to attend to my business at the United States Express company's office now. You know I've got to work for a living. I expect to be at business every day until I go away this summer. But once in a while I may go down to Washington because you know, I can't help it."

JOHN AND MELISSA SHARP HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

Kansas City, March 6.—John Sharp, better known as "Adam God," and his wife, Melissa Sharp, were given a preliminary hearing here today, and were held to the criminal court charged with the murder of Patrolman Michael Mulligan.

On Dec. 8 of last year Sharp, a religious fanatic, and John Pratt, his first disciple, in company with their families, attacked the city police here, resulting in the death of two policemen, Pratt, Pratt's 11-year-old daughter and a bystander.

PROPOSED SALE OF UNEMPLOYED MEN STOPPED

New York, March 5.—The proposed "sale" of unemployed men at the Parkside Presbyterian church in the Flatbush section of Brooklyn, was not held last night because of police interference. It had been announced that 20 men with their faces covered by masks to avoid the humiliation, would be auctioned off from the pulpit to the highest bidder. A similar sale had recently been held successfully and the Rev. John D. Long interested himself in the matter and decided to procure employment for other destitute men in this way.

The police stopped the sale by virtue of a section of the penal code which says that "an assemblage in public houses or other places of three or more persons disguised by having their faces painted, discolored, colored or concealed, is unlawful."

Although it was not absolutely necessary to have the men masked when the church authorities saw the police on hand they decided to call the auction off.

DREAM OF LUXURY TO BE CUT SHORT

City Engineer's Request for An
Automobile to Be Blue
Penciled.

OTHER REQUISITIONS DOOMED

Jake Raleigh, Humans Officer Kendall
And Others Have Too Extrava-
gant View of Necessities.

When the city council meets tonight, the building of a fire station in the southwestern part of the city, the budget and the wide-tire ordinance will come up for discussion. The fire committee will recommend the erection of a station to be equipped with a chemical and hose wagon and several hundred feet of hose. It will probably be approved and then a location will be decided upon. A petition is now before the council to have it built at Eighth West and Eighth South streets.

The budget will probably cause a heated discussion. One item for the expenditure of \$1,000 for an automobile for City Engineer Keely will be opposed by Councilman Hall, and an effort will be made to strike it from the budget. The wide-tire ordinance for the street department is expected and it will also probably be whittled down. Humans Officer Kendall's requisition will undoubtedly be cut. The city is in need of money for legitimate expenses, and several of the councilmen have made a solemn resolve to reduce the extravagance in several of the departments.

The wide-tire ordinance which has been amended by Jake Raleigh to suit his firm of teamsters as well as the others, will be opposed by Councilman Black. As the amended ordinance reads it provides for a three-inch tire to carry loads from 4,000 to 5,000 pounds. These loads are too heavy for Councilman Black says, and the tires will damage the asphalt.

The controversy between the council and the Oregon Short Line will probably come up again tonight, over the location of the foot viaduct, which the railroad company has almost completed. Councilman Holley declares that the foot bridge has not been constructed according to the franchise, and he asks to have it removed from its present position and placed on the north line of South Temple street running directly through the new depot building.

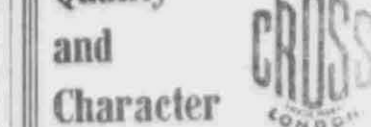

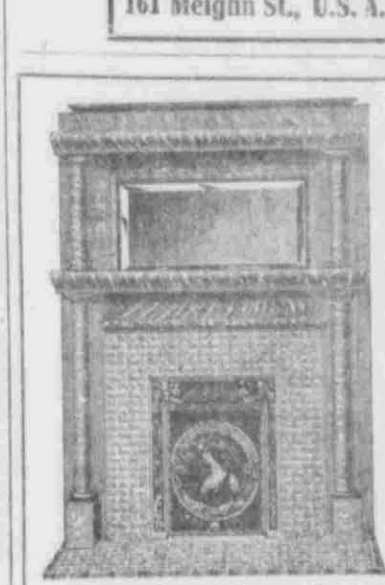
