

Co., arrested on charges of unl. coh.—Chas. A. Andersen, of Hyrum, released from the Utah Pen.; also Isabella Adamson who had been confined for contempt of court.

Wed. 4.—John Harwood, of Nephi, Frederick Petersen and William D. Newsom, of Salt Lake City, Peter S. Barton, of Clarkston, Cache Co., and Daniel Harvey were released from the Utah Pen., having been imprisoned for breaking the Edmunds law. Newsom and Barton were pardoned by the President.

Thurs. 5.—The Fifty-eighth annual conference convened in Salt Lake City, and was continued until the 6th. It was very well attended. A general board of education to superintend Church schools was sustained, consisting of Wilford Woodruff, Lorenzo Snow, George Q. Cannon, Karl G. Maeser, Horace S. Eldredge, Willard Young, George W. Thatcher, Anthon H. Lund and Amos Howe. A train on the Milwaukee & St. Paul Ry. plunged into a river; 12 killed, 20 injured.

Fri. 6.—Jens P. Holm, of Salt Lake City, arrested on a charge of unl. coh., and placed under bonds. After examination before Commissioner Norrell on the 9th he was discharged.

Sun. 8.—Victoria Lee, daughter of John D. Lee, suicided at Winslow, Arizona.

Mon. 9.—Forty people killed and five hundred injured by a tornado at Dacca, India.

Tu. 10.—The city council committee in Salt Lake City, reported favorably on sewerage.—Soren Christophersen Hansen arrested at Manti, Sanpete Co., on a charge of unl. coh.

Wed. 11.—In the Third District Court, Salt Lake City, Daniel Jones, of Salt Lake County, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and \$300 fine and costs for unl. coh.—John T. Gerber, of Granger, released from the Utah Pen., where he had been confined for unl. coh.—Jonah Evans, of Ogden, was accidentally killed on the Central Pacific Ry., west of Terrace, Utah.

Thurs. 12.—William S. Muir, of Bountiful, and Samuel Andersen, of Salt Lake City, released from the Utah Pen.

Fri. 13.—Charles McCarthy, of American Fork and Victor Sandgren, of Pleasant Grove, released from the Utah Pen., having served their terms for unl. coh.

Sat. 14.—In the First District Court, at Provo, H. H. Cluff, of the Utah State Presidency, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and \$300 fine and costs, and Charles Monk, of Spanish Fork, to four months and costs, for unl. coh.—Jesse R. Turpin, of Granger, Salt Lake Co., and Edward Cliff, of Mount Pleasant, released from the Utah Pen.—Chester Draper, of Moroni, Sanpete Co., accidentally shot and killed, at Chester.—Riley Cole suicided by drowning himself in the Weber River, at Riverdale, Weber Co. His body was found May 10th.

Sun. 15.—The body of Andrew Brown, who had disappeared mysteriously some months previous, was found near Snowville, Box Elder Co.

Mon. 16.—James Welsh, of Coalville, released from the Utah Pen., having served his term for unl. coh.—Six men were hurt, some of them seriously, in a coal mine, at Almy, Wyoming.

Tu. 17.—William Parkins arrested at Bountiful, and R. Bird, at Springville, Utah Co., on charges of unl. coh.—Germand Ellsworth released from the Utah Pen.

Wed. 18.—Hans Olson, of Millville, Cache Co., arrested at Marsh Valley, Idaho, on a charge of polygamy, and Lars C. Christensen at Hyde Park, and Niels P. Olsen and Ole Olsen at Smithfield, Cache Co., on charges of unl. coh.—William Bybee, who had been stabbed by Mark Hall, died at Ogden. Mr. Hall was arrested for murder.—Ex-Senator Roscoe Conkling, a prominent American statesman, died at New York.

Thurs. 19.—Richard Fry, of Morgan, John Jenkins, of Newton, Cache Co., and Ferd. Oberhansli, released from the Utah Pen., where they had served terms for living with their wives.

Sat. 21.—In the Third District Court, Salt Lake City, William J. Jenkins and William H. Tovey were sentenced to a second term of six months in the penitentiary, and to

pay a fine of \$50 and costs, each.—Rodney C. Badger, of Salt Lake City, and Ralph Smith released from the Utah Pen.

Sun. 22.—R. Hoekstrasser, of Providence, released from the Utah Pen.

Mon. 23.—John Harris, of Pleasant Grove, and Byron W. Ktng, of Bountiful, released from the Utah Pen., having served terms for breaking the Edmunds law.

Wed. 25.—Andrew E. Berlin, and Christian Petersen, of Huntsville, Olaf Hansen, of Logan, and David B. Bybee, of Davis County, released from the Utah Pen., having served their terms for unl. coh.

Thurs. 26.—George Newby, aged 21 years, Mary B. Wilson, aged seven, and Emily Wilson, aged five, were accidentally drowned in Ogden River, near the mouth of Ogden Canyon. Their bodies were subsequently found.—Hans E. Nielsen, of Hyrum, Cache Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.—Henry Hughes released from the Utah Pen.

Fri. 27.—Christian Hansen, of Brigham City, and Andrew G. Strauberg, of Huntsville, having served their terms in the Utah Pen., were released; but Strauberg was immediately sent back to serve another term.—Jens Hansen, of Mill Creek, and David West, of Pleasant Grove, Utah Co., arrested on charges of unl. coh.

Sat. 28.—Lars Mortensen and M. P. Mortensen, of Brigham City, released from the Utah Pen., having served for unl. coh.—The steamship Wyoming sailed from Liverpool, England, with 74 Saluts under the direction of Franklin S. Bramwell. The company reached New York May 10th, and arrived in Salt Lake City, May 11th.

Mon. 30.—In the Third District Court, John R. Barnes, of Kayville, was sentenced to three months imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$300 and costs for unl. coh.—President Cleveland nominated Millville W. Fuller, of Chicago, for chief justice of the U. S. Supreme Court. The Senate confirmed the nomination July 20th.

#### MAY.

The Mississippi River overflowed its banks causing serious destruction of property.—Negro Slavery in Brazil was abolished by legislative enactment, and a million slaves set free.—Hail storms in India destroyed 2,000 houses, killed 170 people and injured 200 others.—Three thousand persons were drowned by the floods of Canton River, China.

Wed. 2.—The Utah Supreme Court ruled that the Titling Office and other personal Church property should be turned over to the Receiver. Chief Justice Zane dissented from this opinion.—Moroni M. Sheets was brought into court from the penitentiary, where he had been imprisoned a month for refusing to answer questions in regard to the Church suits. He now answered the questions and was released.—Hans C. H. Beck, of Chester, Sanpete Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.

Thurs. 3.—H. H. Schettler, having been pardoned by Pres. Cleveland, was liberated from the Utah Pen.—N. V. Jones in whose case the Utah Supreme Court had ordered a new trial, was liberated from the penitentiary.

Fri. 4.—In the Third District Court, Salt Lake City, "Little Charlie", a Chinaman, was sentenced to imprisonment for life for killing "Chinese Mary" at Alta, Oct. 9, 1887.

Sat. 5.—By a terrible railroad accident on the Philadelphia and Reading Ry., near Mt. Carmel, Penn., a number of people were killed and wounded.—"Mormons" were excluded from Democratic Territorial Convention at Ogden.

Sun. 6.—Alexandrina Bruce was dashed against a tree in Ogden, and killed.

Mon. 7.—Richard Mitchell was accidentally killed near the head of Provo River, Wasatch Co., and Chief Engineer Morgan G. Foote by a run-away near Park City.

Tu. 8.—Michael Wahlan was waylaid and murdered in Gila County, Arizona.

Wed. 9.—Isaac Farley, of Ogden, released from the Utah Pen.—Dr. Friedrich Hirth, a prominent Chinese doctor, visited Salt Lake City.—An address signed by nearly four thousand Christian ministers was presented to Minister Gladstone, approving of his efforts of home rule for Ireland.

Thurs. 10.—Ten thousand dollars raised

in Salt Lake City for advertising the city.—William Wheeler released from the Utah Pen.

Fri. 11.—W. H. Kelsey and Lorin Harmer, of Springville, Utah Co., were arrested on charges of unl. coh.—In the Third District Court, Salt Lake City, Dr. Bredemeyer was sentenced to one year's imprisonment in the Pen., for adultery.—Charles W. Nibley arrested at Logan, on a charge of unl. coh. After a preliminary examination he was discharged a few days later.

Sat. 12.—In the First District Court, at Ogden, Edwin R. Miles, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$50 and costs for unl. coh.

Mon. 14.—Deputy marshals demanded the Latter-day Saint tabernacle at Logan as Church property, but was refused.—By a railway collision and explosion, at Fountain, Col., many persons were killed, and the station and train burned.

Tu. 15.—William Kelly, of American Fork, Utah Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.

Wed. 16.—After a lengthy trial in the Third District Court, Salt Lake City, Richard Grant, indicted for manslaughter for having killed Peter Andersen, at Park City, Nov. 3, 1887, was acquitted.—C. P. Nielsen, of Moroni, Sanpete Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.—Albert Hays, of Provo, and John Walton, of Alpine, Utah Co., arrested together with their alleged plural wives, in Provo Valley, on charges of unl. coh.

Thurs. 17.—Andrew Madsen released from the Utah Pen.

Fri. 18.—In the First District Court, at Ogden, Fred. Yates was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and a fine of \$100 and costs, for unl. coh.

Sat. 19.—Bishop Ezekiel Holman, of Sandy, arrested on a charge of unl. coh.—Hans Funk, of Newton, released from the Utah Pen.—The steamship Wyoming sailed from Liverpool, England, with 137 Saints in charge of William Wood. The company arrived at New York May 30th, and at Salt Lake City June 6th.

Mon. 21.—The Temple at Manti, Sanpete Co., was dedicated. This is the third Temple completed in Utah, and is the finest structure erected in the Rocky Mountains. Its entire cost will be nearly \$1,000,000.—Bishop William West, of Paris, Bear Lake Co., Idaho, arrested on a charge of unl. coh.

Tu. 22.—Five hundred persons drowned by high water in Mesopotamia.

Wed. 23.—W. F. Higby and L. C. Larsen released from the Utah Pen.—George Perkins shot and killed his wife and Charles Talbot and then killed himself at Labelle, Bingham Co., Idaho.

Thurs. 24.—Peter Benson, of Newton, and Alvin Crockett released from the Utah Pen.

Fri. 25.—In the First District Court, at Ogden, C. S. Wingo, of Hyrum and John Seaman, were sentenced to six months' imprisonment, \$50 fine and costs each, for unl. coh.—Edward Davis, of South Cottonwood, Salt Lake Co., having been arrested on a charge of unl. coh., was placed under bonds. His wife lost her reason because of the prosecution.—A. C. Nielsen, E. Poulsen and J. F. F. Dorius were arrested at Ephraim, Sanpete Co., on charges of unl. coh.—One hundred and three fishermen were lost in a gale off the coast of Ireland.

Sat. 26.—William T. Reid, of Manti, liberated from the Utah Pen.—In the First District Court, at Ogden, Jens Christensen was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and \$50 fine; Lorenzo V. Aldron to six months' imprisonment and \$300 fine, and Winslow Farr to six months and \$400 fine and costs, all for unl. coh.—Charles Hayes was literally blown to pieces by an explosion of gun powder at the Daly Mine, Park City.

Sun. 27.—Apostle Erastus Snow died in Salt Lake City.

Mon. 28.—James S. Brown, of Salt Lake City, released from the Utah Pen.—Amos W. Hays fell a distance of thirty feet from the Provo Woollen factory at Provo, Utah Co., and was killed.—Mrs. Elizabeth Watson gored to death by a steer at Haber City, Wasatch Co.—In the First District Court, at Ogden, James Bywater, of Brigham City, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment
