

## UNIONIST TARIFF REFORM PROPOSALS

Duties to be Placed on Practically All Goods That Are Not Deemed Raw Material.

### REVENUE AND PROTECTION

Rates to be From Five to Fifteen Per Cent—Broadstuffs to Be Taxed.

London, Dec. 7.—The Birmingham Daily Post tomorrow will publish an article from inspired sources outlining the tariff reform proposals that are likely to be made by the Unionist government at the elections, prefacing it with the remark that the country's financial necessities are much greater than they were in 1906, when Joseph Chamberlain started the movement.

### FOR GENERAL TARIFF.

The article continues: "It is proposed to establish a general tariff, placing duties on practically all goods that are not deemed raw material, with the object, first, of raising revenues; second, of assisting the home producer against foreign competition; third, of giving preference to colonies; fourth, of securing better terms from foreign countries; and fifth, of mitigating unemployment by encouraging the home producer."

"The tariff will be of the simplest possible form, not protective in the sense that it understood in Germany and the United States. There is no intention of having multifarious rates which would throw open the door to parliamentary intrigues. The plan favored is to allow raw materials duty free and to impose a 5 per cent duty on partly manufactured goods, 10 per cent on articles nearly completed and 15 per cent on completely manufactured goods. There will be no variations in this scale, unless in exceptional cases. There may possibly be, however, a slightly lower duty in favor of the colonies and a slightly higher tariff against British goods."

### TO TAX BREADSTUFFS.

"Foreign wheat will be liable to a duty of two shillings per quarter, with preference to the colonies, but not the removal of the whole duty."

"Flour will pay a higher rate to encourage home grinding, while barley and maize will also be excluded from the free list. Important raw materials, such as cotton and wool, will enter free."

"A tariff framed thus, it is estimated, would produce a revenue of from £16,000,000 to £20,000,000. If the Unionists are returned every possible effort will be made to embody the new duties in the budget of 1910, or at least 1911, but the maximum duties will be withheld for two years to give time to negotiate commercial agreements with foreign countries."

The Right Hon. George Wyndham, member of the house of commons for Dover, speaking in London tonight, also intimated the intention of the Unionists to propose a 10 per cent duty on manufactured articles and two shillings on wheat.

cotton federation of Great Britain, revealed himself as a strong advocate of free trade. "I have been struck," he said, "by the feebleness of the arguments by those who would seriously endanger the cotton trade by changing our fiscal policy. In 50 years Lancashire has doubled in population, doubled its cotton spinning and manufacturing machinery, and built up an export trade three times bigger than its home trade. This enormous growth has been maintained by the cheapness of production. Tax food and mill requisites and our pre-eminence would be endangered. Protected America, where two-thirds of the world's cotton crop grows, only exports 10 per cent of her manufactured goods, against England's 75 per cent."

"Hitherto other nations have discounted to some extent the handicap which protection imposes upon them by working longer hours, but next year the mills of Massachusetts and Germany will, by statute, have working hours reduced to nearly the same level as England. Let the cotton industry be imperiled and every other

industry suffers. The teeming population of Lancashire are among the biggest consumers of agricultural produce."

## SENATOR SMOOT FOR WOMAN'S RIGHTS

Washington, Dec. 7.—"There is just as much need that a woman should be taught how to cook and sew, make her own hats and darn her husband's socks, if she has a husband, or expects to get one, as there is to teach a man how to farm," said Senator Smoot today.

He followed the statement with the announcement that he would introduce a bill making appropriations of \$10,000 each to agricultural colleges, which funds were to be used in the teaching of domestic science.

Senator Smoot acknowledges fun would be made of such a measure and that it would be opposed from many quarters, but he says he feels assured he can have it enacted.

### FEDERAL NOMINATIONS.

President Sends to Senate a List of Twelve Hundred Nominees.

Washington, Dec. 7.—President Taft today sent to the Senate a list of about 1,200 nominees to federal offices. Practically all are recess appointments that have been announced from time to time as made, and the greater part of the list is made up of postmasters in the smaller cities and census supervisors.

One of the important new announcements is that of the reappointment of Franklin Lane as a member of the interstate commerce commission.

Sandford B. Dore, former governor of the Hawaiian Islands, has been named as U. S. judge for the territory of Hawaii.

Cody, Wyo., Dec. 7.—F. A. Ash, manager of the Western Drug company here, was slain last night by a trap gun, set in such a manner that it went off as he entered his sleeping room. The full load of shot entered his abdomen. Ash had no enemies so far as known.

### RENOUNCES PRINCELY RANK.

Berlin, Dec. 7.—The renunciation by Frederick Von Sayn Wittgenstein of his princely rank with all the privileges associated with the same has been gazetted. Emperor William as king of Prussia has conferred upon the ex-prince the title of Baron Von Allenburg.

The renunciation was at the decision of the other male members of the family and in accordance with the family law established in 1607 which provides that any member marrying beneath his rank shall lose his inherited right of title. In 1903, Frederick married Marie Louise Vertling, a woman of the middle class.

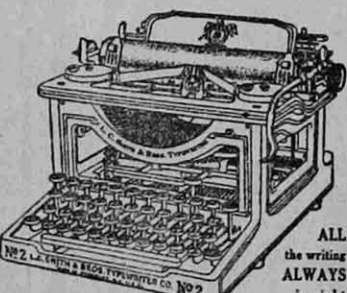
