

## LABOR LEADERS AND IMMIGRATION

In Conference With Secy. Straus  
They Freely Criticized Pres-  
ent Laws Governing It.

### RESTRICTIONS WERE URGED.

Valentine of Molders' Union Said Con-  
ditions Affecting Unemployed  
Worse Than in 1873 and 1893.

Washington, Feb. 11.—At the conference of leaders of organized labor with Secy. Straus of the department of commerce and labor, which was continued today, criticism of present immigration laws was made by nearly every speaker, including President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, Warren S. Stone of the Locomotive Engineers, and president Valentine of the Molders' union.

Mr. Valentine declared that conditions affecting unemployed workmen were worse than in the panic years of 1873 and 1893. He urged restrictions on immigration.

Secretary Straus pointed out that the United States had international obligations as old as the country itself which could not be abrogated, even when it might seem temporarily advantageous to do so.

"If we were to undertake that," said the secretary, "from the standpoint of unity and international intercourse, our action might be tantamount to a declaration of war with a foreign power."

Commissioner of Labor Neil, who has been called to the conference by Secretary Straus, corroborated Mr. Valentine's statements.

He criticized, by intimation, the direction of the work of the division of information. Mr. Neil said that he was not in the conference "to skin anybody's skunk." He was there, he said, to state the fact and without reference to anybody.

While Secretary Straus had little to say regarding this development he was evidently not pleased with the attitude of the commissioner.

### CROOKED WORK OF A BOOTH & COMPANY

Chicago, Feb. 11.—Frederick R. Robins, formerly assistant treasurer of A. Booth & Co., testifying under oath at the hearing held by the master in chancery, said that the books of the company were properly kept, but that in a statement presented in 1907 to the Commercial National bank, the Commercial National bank, the Corn Exchange National bank and the First National bank, the bills payable by the firm were stated to be \$1,000,000 and the bills receivable increased by about the same amount, a difference of about \$2,000,000 in all. ## LINCOLN HOLIDAY PROCLAMATION

Perst. Roosevelt Issues one for  
Observance of Centennial An-  
niversary of Emancipator.

### APPLICATION IS RESTRICTED.

Effective Only Where General Gov-  
ernment Has Exclusive Jurisdiction  
—Authorized by Congress.

Washington, Feb. 11.—By joint resolution today Congress made provision as far as possible for the observance of Feb. 12, 1909, the centennial anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln as a special holiday, and authorized the president to issue a proclamation making it effective in the District of Columbia and the territories of Alaska, Arizona, New Mexico and Hawaii.

In anticipation of the passage of such a resolution after he had departed for Lincoln's birthday in Kentucky, the president had prepared and signed a proclamation which was issued as soon as the joint resolution had been signed by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house.

While that proclamation applies only to the District of Columbia and the territories, the states of Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Kansas, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Washington and Wisconsin.

TEXT OF PROCLAMATION.

Following is the president's Lincoln day proclamation:  
A proclamation:  
Whereas, By joint resolution of Congress it is provided that the twelfth day of February, 1909, the same being the centennial anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln, and the same is hereby made a special legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the territories of the United States; and  
Whereas, By the said joint resolution the president is authorized to issue a proclamation in accordance with the foregoing, setting apart the twelfth day of February, 1909, as a special legal holiday;  
Now, therefore, I, Theodore Roosevelt, president of the United States of America, in virtue of the authority conferred upon me by the said joint resolution, do hereby proclaim the twelfth day of February, 1909, as a special legal holiday.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. Done at the city of Washington, this eleventh day of February, in the year of our Lord, one thousand, nine hundred and nine, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and thirty-third.

LETTER TO MEMBERS  
OF THE LEGISLATURE

To the Honorable Members of the Utah Legislature:  
Gentlemen—Never before in the history of Utah has a legislative body been called face to face with a problem of so grave a nature, and one that is so universally championed by the people of Utah as the prohibition movement you are now considering. It is a case where the hard tolling citizen, the devoted wife and mother, and in fact each and every home throughout this state looks to you for the redress of the wrongs now upon us. Your constituents, state-wide, are placing the hope in your honorable body that you will legislate such laws that will place the whiskey traffic under the ban of the law, and it is within your power to legislate together and right the wrong that is the cause of so many unhappy homes in Utah, as well as that of the vice and corruption that surround each and every village throughout the state.

You are face to face with the wishes of the people of Utah on the one hand and the power and influence of the political few on the other, who so it is claimed, to win Salt Lake county at the last election, sold the people of Utah for a mess of pottage.

When you gentlemen were elected to your present office calling it was almost without an exception on a platform of prohibition. You were made known then with the people's request and you understood it as you do now. You have received numerous requests from your constituents to stand true to them and their wishes, in using every effort to have a prohibition law passed. In some instances your people have sent special delegations to carry to you their wishes. One case of this kind came to your notice a few days ago, and with what result? That that body of men returned to their people with no encouragement at all. Their representative, who like the dog that bit the hand that fed it, turns them down.

The public voting privilege of the nation is a boon to its citizens, but on the other hand it is a sin to the body politic to have the wishes of the masses totally ignored and the trust in their elected representatives, maltreated and abused as is being done by some members of the present legislature.

The desire for state-wide prohibition is the universal request of the citizens of Utah, and in the face of that, a few men at the head of the Republican party of this state, stand defiant against the wishes of the masses, which, of course, they are compelled to do, or break their pledge with the voters of house. These political organizers find themselves tied up in the clutches of the giant whiskey octopus, and that to the disgust of the people, Salt Lake county should fight its way out of the present dilemma, as best it can, without drawing other counties into the mess.

It is within your power to give us state-wide prohibition and your constituents are asking what they can expect as to your loyalty to them.
