LOCAL BRIEFS.

Feast of Conclusion—The Feast of Conclusion will be celebrated this evening, in the Jewish Temple, when Rabbi Freund will lecture on the Book of Ecclesiastes.

County Teachers—The county teachers will hold their regular meeting of the fall term, Saturday morning, in the City and County building, where Prof. Marshall will lecture and the Imperial Glee club will furnish music.

Water Applied For—W. B. Albertson of this city filed application yesterday afternoon, with the state engineer, for 40 second feet of water from Big Cottonwood creek, for power purposes. Four 60-inch Pelton wheels will be used to furnish 2,500 horsepower.

Aged Bridegroom—The oldest bridegroom who ever appeared in the county clerk's office applied for a marriage license yesterday. He is Thomas Morgan, aged 81, residing at his home in Susan Wilbur aged 67 years. Mr. Morgan is a pioneer in Idaho and resides at Rudy, Ida. The couple came to the city last week to attend conference.

Debates Arranged—Interclass debates have been arranged for at the state university, and each class will have a team. Eldridge Custodian—The county commissioners yesterday afternoon appointed County Clerk Eldridge as custodian of the new voting machines belonging to the county and C. V. Anderson as assistant custodian. The work of placing the machines at various public places for the instruction of voters was commenced yesterday. Before the last days of registration machines will be placed in each voting district so that the public may become thoroughly acquainted with their working. Each political headquarters will have a machine with which to instruct the party workers.

"The problem of the care of the mentally defective children is becoming very pressing in Utah, and the health organization and local registrars will greatly contribute to the public welfare by assisting in securing statistics as to the number of cases of that character in the state. Will you please fill out and return the enclosed card, making careful inquiry and including all cases within your town or district of feeble-minded persons, imbeciles, and idiots, under the age of 20 years, and if possible, the data shall be secured as soon as possible, and your prompt attention is earnestly requested."

Civic League Meeting—At last night's meeting of the Civic league, the committee appointed two weeks ago to consider a plan for changing the form of local government for Salt Lake, reported that no detailed scheme had as yet been worked out, but that it was found advisable to bring about such a change as had been suggested. The report eliminated the mayor, city council and departments as at present conducted, and placed the entire machinery of the municipal government in the hands of a commission. The plan has been found to work satisfactorily at Galveston, Washington, and elsewhere. It was decided to call another meeting two weeks hence, at the Commercial club, and invite newspaper editors, and local officials to attend. The committee consists of O. H. Hewitt, Geo. N. Lawrence, W. A. King, M. H. Walker and R. L. Pritchard.
