Two Children Found Talf Starved Filthy Cellar.

One of the most pitiable cases ev before the juvenile court was that two dependent infants, Zena Maud Ma tin, aged 4 years, and Olive Blanch Fairchild, aged 11 months, who we yesterday ordered taken from their pa ents and placed in the custody of the Infants' Home and Protective associa-tion.
