WORDS OF WARNING ON DANCER OF MIXED MARRIAGES

Chicago, April 16.-Words of warn-ing of the dangers apt to follow mar-riages of Jews with non-Jews were spoken today by Dr. Emil G. Hirsch in his sermon in Sinal temple. Differ-ences in views of religious matters and of other "fundamental things of life." the speaker said, constituted great ob-stacles. His subject was "Mixed Mar-

lages. 'I have shown my sanction of such marriages by performing the ceremony itself, and such marriages are sanc-tioned, but they should not be encour-aged actively." he said. The present day tendency to disre-gard parental advice was deplored, and

the climax of the sermon was reached when Dr. Hirsch said:

when Dr. Hirsch sald: "At best marriage never is smooth sailing, and when young persons feel brave enough and strong enough to fol-low when love has bridged a chasm caused by 1,500 years of persecution of the Jews, and do so in the face of pa-rental objections, they often find the way has bitterness worse than agony." Continuing, he said: "So I say, even if all other considerations are forgot-ten, and for the sake of the world, if ten, and for the sake of the world, if not for the Jewish faith, the hand of





Budapest, Hungary, April 16 .- The movement to establish a customs tariff for Hungary alone, as distinct from the present Austro-Hungarian tariff, is gaining strength and popularity here and is becoming an important factor in the serious question of Austro-Hun-garian relations. This matter came up prominently in 1898, when Hungary even got so far as preparing full rates Morgan and his coat of arms.

TROUBLE AT LIMOGES.

Procelain Strikers Are Becoming Very Violent.

Limoges, France, April 16.-The ex-citement among the porcelain strikers is becoming more violent and manifestng itself principally against the Amer-can firm of Haviland, which has taken a leading part in the lookout. The so-cialist mayor's attitude of inactivity and his appeal to the ministry not to send troops appears to encourage the workmen to continue their demonstrations. They exploded a package of car-tridges before the house of the manager of the Haviland works, without, how-

of the Haviland works, without, how-ever, causing much damage. The bar-ricades which were erected on Satur-day are still in place. A procession of several thousand men, some of them armed, paraded the streets this morning, proceeding to the prison, where they unsuccessfully at-tempted to fore the donra. The methods

empted to fore the doors. The mob then destroyed a religious statue. A picket of troops endeavored to break up that demonstration, but the strikers resist-ed, stoning the soldiers and hooting the officers. The crowd finally dis-persed on the arrival of cavalry.
