Minneapolis, Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of 370 cars against 222 a year ago. The corn market was rather weak on molerate profit-taking. Pavorable wea-ther for the new crops was one of the principal depressing influences. Other fac-tors were easy cables and liberal ship-ments from Argentins.
