The polish of which the surfaces of certain bodies, such as steel, the diamond, and other precious stones, are susceptible is an evidence at once of the limited sensibility of our organs and the unlimited divisibility of matter. This polish is produced, as is well known, by the friction of emery powder or diamond dust, and consequently, each individual grain of such powder or dust must have a little trench or trace upon the surface subjected to such friction. It is evident therefore, that, after this process has been completed, the surface which presents to the senses such brilliant polish, and apparently infinite smoothness, is, in reality, covered with protuberances and indentations, the height and depth of which cannot be less than the diameter, of the particles of powder by which the polish has been produced.

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
