George H. Mendell, Jr., assistant secretary of the Firemen's Fund Insur-ance company, is a guest at the Knutsford hotel from San Francisco. Mr. Mendell is much interested in the pro-posed improvement of Sait Lake City's water supply and provision against fire. The weather office thinks the coldest weather of the winter is past and that there will be settled weather for some little time. The record shows that the last decade in February is characterized by a marked rise in the temperature.
