Luna, Socorro County, New Mexico, Feb. 2.—This might be called a "valley in the tops of the mountains," and it is in the tops of the mountains, The surrounded by pine clad hills. The nearest settlement as Alpine, over the nearest settlement as Mission. The altitude is over seven thousand feet; the weather is never hot nor does it ever get very cold. The past few years this part of the country has suffered from drouth, and this has been one of the dryest and most open winters of any, and people are fearful for next season;

as the reservoirs are empty, and unless there is rain there will be no crop. Most of the men are away at work to get a living for their familles on acount of the crop failure last year.

There are about twenty families here but the population is decreasing rather than increasing, owing to the prevalence of drouth.

RESERVOIRS BUT NO WATER. The past season the people here com-

pleted a large reservoir in the lower end of Bush Valley, which, if filled, is estimated to irrigate all the land in this valley for two seasons. The assurance of water to irrigate with would make this a desirable place to live as the land is rich and productive.

NARROW MINDED POLICY. The people have been annoyed some by the timber reserve agents, who forbade the taking of even the dry and fallen wood for fuel, but now the settlers have permission to take this fire wood and even poles to fence their farms.

Up to seven years ago the people here had plenty of water for frrigation but since then the drouth has increased in

# THE FESTIVAL OF ST. VALENTINE.

The Lupercalia, feasts in honor of Faunus or Lupercus, were heathen cci-ebrations, and it is believed that early Christian pastors, in their endeavor to eradicate the heathen superstitions, substituted the names of particular saints for the especial festival days of more ancient pagan observance. As the feasts of Lapercalia were celebrated in the middle of February, they se-lected the 14th of February as the day

of honor for St. Valentine, Mission, who in 1698 published "Travels in England." wrote: "On the eve of St. Valentine's Day the

young folks in England and Scotland. by a very ancient custom, celebrate a little festival. An equal number of maids and bachelors write their or feigned name upon separata billets. which they roll up and draw by way of lots, the maids taking the men's billets and the men the maids;' so that each of the young men lights upon a young girl that he calls his valentine, and each of the girls upon a young man that she calls hers. By this means each has two valentines; but the man clings to the valentine that has fallen to his lot rather than the one who calls him hers. Fortune having thus divided the company into so many couples, the valen-tines give balls and treats, wear their billets several days upon their sleeves.

### But Soldiers Cannot be Told From Horses at 2,000 Yards.

"When people read that armies are engaging each other at 2,000 yards dis-tance they think the combatants can see each other, but they cannot," said an officer. "At that distance it is impossible to distinguish between a man and a horse, and at 1,200 yards, especi-ally where there is any dust, it requires the best kind of eyes to tell infantry from cavalry. At 900 yards the movements become clearer, although it is not until they get within 750 yards of each other that the heads of the columns can be made out with anything like certainty,

"Infantry can be seen in the sunlight much more easily than cavalry or artillery because less dust is raised. sides, infantry are distinguished by the glitter of their muskets. At 2,000 yards, however, everything is unsatisfactory, even with the aid of field glasses, for a marching column in dry weather raises a great deal of dust .....
