One feature that had impressed him was the statement in the Elders' report, that some had not kept the promise they made, before ordina. tion, to attend to their duties. This was a serious matter. The Lord will visit the covenant breaker with severe punishment. The Teachers should take up a labor with those complained of and show them the importance of keeping their covenants. As a people the Latter-day Saints have the reputa-tion of keeping their agreements in their business relations. Yet there is room for improvement in this regard. Yet there is The people should exercise great care la keeping all covenants, both in business and religious matters.

The Saints, as a people, are increasing in faith and good works, as shown by the records. Yet we have not per-fected ourselves in the Gospel. We are subject to the ills of mortality, to the foolishness of men. ought to be more careful and diligent in seekin : to build up Zion, in making our bomes better, and in keeping our covenants as husbands and wives. parents and children, brothers and sisters. The presiding officers and people should strengthe the home industries of the various wards. If we would bend our energies more careful. ly to this object, we would be better We would not send so much of our means abroad, nor be looking so much after the fashions of the of the world, but would have fashions of our own, taught by the revelations of the Lord. If we did this we would improve more rapidly, both temporally

and spiritually.

The Lord has greatly blessed us, We would be prospered more abundantly if we lived nearer to Him. Wherever His people have done His will. He has made them rich in the things of this life as well as given them the riches of eternity. But when they permitted class distinctions, and some have become lifted up above their neighbors, the blessings of the Lord have been withdrawn and destruction has followed. Are we any more His people than those in whose history these examples are given? We have been gathered here to serve the Lord, not to seek the riches of earth any more than the Lord sees fit to bestow them on us. Our only salvation is in learning the will of the Lord and doing it.

ELDER JOSEPH E. TAYLOR

spoke of the large number in the Stake who hold the Priesthood, and of the duty which rested upon them to labor for the salvation of the people. The Bishops should utilize these men of activity and zeal, to instruct and encourage the Saints. Those who were delinquent should be sought after, and, if possible, be induced to perform their duties. If they would not do this, the quorums should withdraw fellowship from them, and report them to the Bishops.
