Too Soft.—The people in the Fifth and Sixth Wards are getting up a petition for presentation to the City Council, representing that the streets in that locality are altogether too soft to be agreeable, pedestrians in that part meeting with great difficulty in the Fall and Spring seasons to "find bottom." We learn of an instance of a lady, returning home the other evening from a visit up town, who got mired, her shoes were sucked off her feet into the mud and she was reduced to the dire necessity of walking the balance of the way without any other covering for her feet than her stockings. This brings to our mind a little circumstance that occurred to a friend of ours in the same locality about eight years ago. It was in his bachelor days and he was walking with "his intended" when he struck one of those deceptive springs; he suddenly felt himself going rapidly downwards and did not stop until he was within a little of being up to his armpits. His struggles to extricate himself from the predicament, with the assistance of his companion, were exceedingly interesting, but could not be said to have been very artistic, and his appearance after he got out, was, to say the least, peculiar. He has never forgotten that circumstance.

The Fifth and Sixth Ward petitioners propose to ask for a deputation of the Council to visit the locality personally and see for themselves whether or not the state of the streets needs attention. If a deputation should be sent on that errand, and should go asoft it is probable the impression made on them would be all the deeper, as would also be the impression they would make on the mud. If the City can afford relief in the matter it will certainly be a great boon to the people of the locality named.

The jurors who answered were then dismissed until Thursday morning, until which time they will not be wanted.

Jurors' Fees.—There appears to be some misunderstanding on the part of some of the grand jurors regarding the Territorial part of their pay, and that the matter may be clearly understood we append the following extract from "An Act to Regulate Fees and Compensation for Official and Other Services in the Territory of Utah," passed by the Legislature last Winter—

"Jurors shall be paid out of the County Treasury of the County wherein they reside, except when serving in civil cases, and it shall be the duty of the clerk of the District Court, at the close of each term of said Court, to make out and give to each juror a certificate certifying the number of days' attendance of, the number of miles travelled by, and amount of compensation due to, said juror in criminal cases, which certificate, on being presented to the County Court of the County from which the said juror was summoned, shall entitle him to be allowed and paid by said County.

Nothing can be plainer or more definite than the foregoing, and we have no reason to doubt, when the jurors' certificates are presented to the auditor of public accounts, the accounts audited and found by him to be correct, and presented, to the County Courts where the jurors reside, that there will be the least difficulty about the matter. The reason why this law making it obligatory upon the counties to pay jurors' fees was enacted by the Legislature was because the Territorial tax is only one-fourth as high as the County tax, and it was thought right, because of this, that the latter should bear the jurors' expenses. We believe there need be no apprehension whatever that the County Courts will not comply with the law.
