

STOLYPIN OPENS ANOTHER BATTERY

The Electioneering Constitutional Democrats Are to be Removed From the Zemstvos.

HIS WARFARE UNRELENTING.

Congress at Helsingfors Shows Great Weakness, Differences Being Irreconcilable.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 10.—Another battery was turned today on the position of the Constitutional Democrats in the open warfare which Premier Stolypin is waging against the majority party in the last parliament, in the form of a circular to the provincial governments in regard to the famine relief, directing the officials to remove from the zemstvos and other local organizations all persons endeavoring to conduct electioneering against the administration under cover of relief work and not to hesitate to close the zemstvos when necessary, though the circular admits that the famine in many provinces is so severe that the government can hope to cope with it only with the aid of these institutions. The measure is in addition to the steps taken against the signers of the Viborg manifesto, whom the governors are directed to remove from the provincial nobility, zemstvo organizations and city councils.

The real attitude of the Constitutional Democrats at the Helsingfors convention is indicated largely by these and other hostile measures, including the holy synod's instructions to the clergy to preach and work against the dissemination of socialism, and a circular forbidding government employees to belong to Constitutional Democratic or other opposition parties and ordering the dismissal of persistent members.

Premier Stolypin's organ says the campaign against the Constitutional Democrats is justified by the Viborg manifesto, which it declares, placed the Constitutional Democrats outside the pale of legal parties, but it is said that the premier's action will probably only have the effect of "driving the opposition underground."

In view of the financial situation heavy reductions are to be made in the over-manned government service, it having been determined that 20 per cent of the employees shall be discharged from some of the departments. This is creating more enemies for the administration.

The draft of the law providing for religious freedom, which has been delayed for revision, has again passed the council of ministers. The Straus, though an opposition paper, thoroughly approves of the draft. It declares that it is the only satisfactory law which the administration has yet elaborated.

CONGRESS AT HELSINGFORS.
Helsingfors, Oct. 10.—At today's session of the Constitutional Democratic convention the committee's resolution proclaiming the impossibility of passive resistance was adopted, 44 yeas to 44 noes. The majority amendment recommending organization for passive resistance was rejected by 33 yeas to 53 noes.

The congress has shown a strict weakness in the party which is highly dangerous in view of the approaching electoral campaign, and this in spite of the influence toward cohesion resulting from governmental persecutions. The four days of the debate have done little to reconcile the differences of opinion regarding the Viborg manifesto, which the conservatives, on the other hand, believe should be publicly disowned as a blunder while the extreme radicals on the other hand, demand the reformation of the manifesto in the form of an immediate proclamation urging the financial and military boycott of the government. The resolution of the central committee, which justifies the adoption of the manifesto at Viborg, but finds it inexpedient at the present time to apply its principles to the refusal to pay taxes or grant recruits, has few friends, and was accepted only as a makeshift to avoid the immediate disruption, supported by 30 delegates from the Viborg and

South, to boycott the government, was rejected, as was a proposal made by M. Petrunkevich, the veteran leader, to eliminate the paragraph dealing with the present expediency and leaving in the resolution only commendation for the signers of the Viborg document.

N. Y. COUNTY DEMOCRACY NAMES JUDICIAL TICKET.
New York, Oct. 10.—The Democracy of New York county tonight nominated a judicial ticket that was seemingly intended to be a compromise between the adherents of old line Democrats and candidates favored by the independence league. The ticket, however, has not proved entirely satisfactory to the followers of Mr. Hearst, and a statement issued by the league late tonight hints that the Tammany ticket may not be endorsed in full.

It was understood that the league wished to be represented on the ticket by five candidates acceptable to the party, in that event the league would expect to support the nominations made. Only two of tonight's candidates can, however, be said to be representative of the league. They are Judge Seabury and Judge Ford, named for the supreme court. Recorder Goff, however, is believed not to be objectionable to the league.

The following statement was issued by the executive committee of the independence league late tonight:

"It has been the desire of the executive committee of the league to secure a nomination of a non-partisan judicial ticket. The ticket named by the Democratic convention tonight contains the names of some satisfactory men and the names of some not satisfactory."

"The independence league will watch the action of the Republican convention with interest."

SHAUN KELLEY'S CASE.
Young Roosevelt Corroborates His Story of the Trouble.
Boston, Oct. 10.—Shaun Kelley, room-mate of Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., at Harvard, charged with assault upon Policeman Lawrence Feiner, was placed on trial in the municipal court today before Judge Wentworth. At the conclusion of the hearing, Kelley was held in custody, who is on bail, was present in the courtroom with Roosevelt and F. M. Blagden, coxswain of the Harvard crew. Feiner, on the witness stand, said that no blows were struck, that he was tripped and was injured by falling against a settee. He was on plain clothes duty that night, the officer testified, and when he saw four young men apparently assault another who seemed to offer no resistance, he ran up to interfere. While chasing one of the young men, he said, Kelley tripped him and he had to give up the chase.

Kelley testified that he thought the president's son was being attacked in an unwarranted manner by an unknown man, and that he was justified in defending him. Kelley admitted that he pushed the officer, but did not trip him.

Roosevelt gave brief testimony corroborating Kelley's version of the affair.

AGENT ABSCONDS AND FIRM FAILS

Tremendous and Unexpected Crash of J. M. Ceballos & Co. Of New York.

LOSS RUNS INTO MILLIONS.

Forced to the Wall by Manuel Silveira Of Havana Who is Somewhere On the High Seas.

New York, Oct. 11.—The assignment of J. M. Ceballos & Co., bankers and merchants, with liabilities between \$2,000,000 and \$4,000,000, was announced yesterday afternoon in a statement which declared that the failure was due to the defection and absconding of Manuel Silveira of Silveira & Co., Havana. Silveira's defection is alleged to amount to about \$1,000,000. He sailed from Havana on Oct. 2, ostensibly for New York City to consult with the members of J. M. Ceballos & Co., but has not reached this city. Counsel for the assignees said today that Silveira has left on his own steamer, the Carmelina, for parts unknown, accompanied by his wife and children, and that every effort was being made to locate him.

Members of the firm of J. M. Ceballos & Co., which included John S. Fiske, John S. Fiske, Jr., John S. Fiske, Sr., and John S. Fiske, Jr., are now at work on the books of the company. It was stated unofficially that there was ground to hope that the assets would be sufficient to cover the losses of the firm, and that it would be enabled to resume business.

J. M. Ceballos & Co. was established about 10 years ago, and has large interests in Cuba, chiefly in the development of railroads and sugar plantations. It operates a line of steamers between New York and Spanish ports, and has connections in Spain, European and Spanish American cities.

STATEMENT OF COUNSEL.
The following statement was given out by Sullivan & Cromwell announcing the assignment of J. M. Ceballos & Co., bankers of New York and Havana, have today made a general assignment for the benefit of their creditors to William A. Crowell, of the law firm of Sullivan & Cromwell, with William Nelson Crowell as counsel to the assignees. The suspension is stated by the firm to be due to the defection of Manuel Silveira, who is alleged to have absconded with the assets of the firm, and who for several years have represented the business of Ceballos & Co. His deficiency amounts to nearly \$1,000,000 in money and other property.

DEFAULTER DISAPPEARS.
"Silveira departed from Havana on Tuesday, the 2nd instant, in one of his own steamers named the Carmelina, with New York as his ostensible destination. In local publications he announced his intention of going to New York, and he was expected to arrive in a matter of days. He was expected to reach New York on a day of this week, but failed to appear, and it has just developed by cable from Havana that he had left on his own ship for parts unknown, accompanied by his wife and children. Every effort is being made to locate the absconder."

HAS MANY INTERESTS.
John M. Ceballos, the senior member of the firm, is connected as president, vice president or director with the following companies: American City Waterworks company, Commercial Investment company of Porto Rico, Courton & Golden company, Development company of Cuba, Horn Silver Mining company, International Banking corporation, Iron Steamship company, Oil Fields of Mexico company, Porto Rico Telephone company, New York and Porto Rico Steamship company, Porto Rico Sugar company, St. Nicholas Skating & Ice company, Silveira Sugar company, Tacon Realty company, United States and Porto Rico Navigation company, and Navigation company and Universal Motor Car company.

FISKE WELL FIXED.
John S. Fiske, partner in the firm of J. M. Ceballos & Co., is connected with the following companies: Cardenas City Waterworks company, Commercial Investment company of Porto Rico, Development company of Cuba, Fiske Fruit company of Cuba, John D. Gordon company, Jucaro Realty company, Manchester Citrus groves, New York and Porto Rico Steamship company, Newfoundland Syndicate, Porto Rico Telephone company, Seville Packing company of New York, Silveira Sugar company, United States and Porto Rico Navigation company, Universal Motor Car company, Varona Land & Investment company, Courtin & Golden company.

A GREAT SURPRISE.
New York, Oct. 11.—News of the failure of J. M. Ceballos & Co. was a great surprise to the banking and commission houses in the financial district where the head of the house was regarded as the most aggressive merchant and banker in the Cuban-American trade.

Ceballos & Co. spread their vast enterprises over the West Indies, South America and as far as Spain. Silveira & Co., of which Manuel Silveira, whose alleged defection with \$1,000,000 caused the failure, has been for many years their agent in the Latin-American countries.

Silveira & Co. were bankers and merchants in Havana, and the firm was considered a bulwark of financial responsibility. The two firms were in the van of the big developing companies on which Cuba relied for her future prosperity.

Juan M. Ceballos, head of the firm, has been for years prominently identified with many international enterprises. He has had a few Wall Street connections and his house was regarded as not so much a Wall Street concern as a promoter of Latin-American enterprises. The effect of the assignment on local firms is problematical.

The loss, he said, could not have come at a worse season for the reason that the house lends money during the harvest and grinding of the sugar crop. Its funds were tied very largely, he declared, in such loans, and it was impossible to call them.

The failure is considered certain to have a damaging effect upon business in Cuba. Among other things it means the abandonment of a comprehensive Cuban railroad scheme which contemplated the construction of an entire new railroad system reaching all the Ceballos properties and covering all that large part of the island not covered with transportation facilities.

GOOD CUBA STANDING.
Manuel Silveira's firm has excellent standing in Cuba. The firm is one of "merchant bankers," the business consisting of handling merchandise of various sorts, instead of securities like banking houses. The firm is the largest importer of cattle into Cuba, bringing in cattle from Venezuela, Texas and Colombia and it was on one of his cattle boats, a craft of 2,000 tons burden, that Silveira with his family left Havana on Oct. 2.

Silveira has been a promoter of many enterprises in Cuba. One of his speculations in which Mr. Ceballos is said to have been associated with him, was the purchase after the war which freed Cuba from Spanish control, of a large mass of soldiers' warrants, which he sought to have redeemed at par and 6 per cent interest. He cleared a large sum by this operation.

MONEY IN BULK.
As the financial agent of Ceballos & Co., Silveira's firm handled money in bulk and often had on hand an excess holding of more than a million dollars. Ceballos & Co. were the business agents for many New York agents and individuals interested in Cuban projects and in this business handled large sums of money for their customers.

At the Hotel America where Cubans and Spaniards make their home, the opinion among all who would express their sentiments was that the expected had happened. They said that Silveira had employed Jose Miguel Gomez, the Liberal candidate for president, whose defeat by Palma had brought on the recent revolution, as general administrator of a vast sugar plantation in the province of Puerto Principe.

"And the way they spent money on that plantation," said one, "was amazing. They spent many thousands of dollars just as if they were building a palace."

The Cubans at the hotel were much interested in the picture in the October number of the Review of Reviews, showing Silveira and Jose Miguel Gomez as the central figures. The suggestion was made that Silveira might have lost a lot of money in promoting the recent revolution.

SILVEIRA NOT ON THE CARMELINA.
New York, Oct. 11.—Manuel Silveira, the defaulting Havana agent for the firm of J. M. Ceballos & Co., is not on board the steamer Carmelina, upon which he is alleged to have left, but on another steamer, which he boarded at sea two days after leaving the Cuban capital according to information which was given out here today.

The precise whereabouts of the Carmelina is known and that the destination of the other steamer to which Silveira and his family were transferred is a matter of speculation.

The charge of defection of more than a million dollars, which has been made against Silveira, was made, according to attorneys Sullivan & Cromwell, who made the announcement, after the news of the Carmelina and the other steamer had been received in this city.

DEPEW IN GOOD HEALTH.
New York, Oct. 10.—For the first time since last March United States Senator Chauncey M. Depew today appeared at a meeting of the executive committee of the New York Central Railway company. Mr. Depew appeared to be in good health, and after the meeting he declared that he is slowly but surely recovering. "At no time within the past year," said the senator, "have I been in such good health and spirits." He said that if his health continued good as he had reason to believe it would, there was little doubt that he would be in his seat when the senate reconvened in December.

EXCHANGE OF MAIL DEVICES.
Chicago, Oct. 11.—The commission appointed by the postmaster general to adopt a device for the exchange of mails at stations where trains do not stop will arrive in Chicago today. The commission consists of Supt. Vickery of the mail service at Washington, Supt. Perkins of St. Paul, Supt. Rogers of Cincinnati, Asst. Supt. Thompson of Atlanta and John Holyday, assistant general superintendent at Washington.

It is the purpose of the commission to go to several points in the west for the purpose of making a thorough investigation extending over a period of two months.
