Try to put a man out with one hard blow and you use up all of your reserve force trying to land. That was the old way of doing things. It was the general impression among the fighters of long ago that only one blow was neces-sary. They depended little upon scientific thowiedge of the game, but simply upon their ability to land one good blow. The result was that a man would defeat him-result was that a man would defeat him-

Nowadays it is different. The idea is to wear your man down either by a blow on the jaw or body, and then he is at your

hercy. I have used the right hand uppercut ef-fectively in many battles. It is one of my favorite blows. Besides the effect-lyeness of the blow. I like it because there are few boxers who can avoid it. It is a most difficult blow to block. Take a straight jab or a swing and your op-ponent, providing he is a clever defensive boxer, will block it by throwing up his guard. A clever man can stop the force of a swing by blocking or covering up with his glove. How many boxers try to stop an upper-cut?

cut? When they see the uppercut coming most boxers, no matter how clever they are, prefer to back out of distance rather than attempt to block if an opponent tifes to stop an uppercut I just slip it up through his guard to the mark. The advantages of the uppercut to tha jaw are many. You can work it either at close quarters or at a distance. When ha dose you can shoot it upward with-out drawing the hand back, which means without loss of time.
