Vancouver, B. C., Sept. D. -Dverything is quiet this murning in about the oriental quarters and there has been no further attempt to renew he anti-Asiatic rioting. Note of the Japanese havy yet returned to their work in the humber mills, which are still clowed down but which expect to reopen tomorrow. The strike of the Chinese cooks hids fair to last longer and restaurants are closed. Hotels, clubs and private families are making shift without cooks. and Vancouver people are receiving an obejet leason in their dependence on Chinese domestics

In their dependence on chinese year mestics. The Chinese and Japanese quarters of Vancouver are practically in a state of slege. Hindreds of revolvers and guns were sold to orientals until the police prohibted the sale of frearms to any one. Every Chinese merchant goes about with an armed body gunri, and heades the entraines to every Chinese stort stands a Mongolian with a Winchester rithe. All the Chinese cooks, will men, isherers and all the Japanese working to the city and in the country within a radius of 15 miles from Vancouver have been summoned in the oriental quarter, and are filling all the houses in the oriental quarter. SPRECKELS PLEADS FAILING MEMORY

When Searching Questions Were Put to Him About Details of

Sale of Refinery.

HE BECAME QUITE IRRITABLE.

Aged "Sugar King" Was on Witness Stand for Penn. Sugar Refining Co. in Big Damage Suit.

San Francisco, Sept. 10.-Claus Spreckels, the aged San Francisco "Sugar king," was examined today before Notary Public D. B. Richards by Atty. John W. Hutchinson, Jr., in hebalf of the Pennsylvania Sugar Relining company, in its \$20,000,000 damage suit against the American Sugar Refining company. The taking of Mr. Spreckels' deposition was the last of a series of examinations Mr. Hutchinson has been conducting here during the past 19 days . He will depart for New York ext Thursday.

next Thursday. The information chiefly desired of Mr. Spreckels concerned his sale of the Spreckels refinery in Philadelphia to the American Sugar Refining company 18 years ago. Atty, A. F. Morrison, coun-sel for the defendant corporation, was present to advise the witness, and at one stage of the proceedings informed him that he need not answer a search-ing question put by Mr. Hutchinson as to the sale price of the Philadelphia re-finery. Mr. Spreckels, who is nearing his eightleth year, was supported dur-fing the examination by his son, John D. Spreckels, The aged millionaire fre-questions of detail were put to him, and he grew irritable when these were he grew fritable when these were

pressed. "Why do you want to bother me? I have already told you I can't remem-ber," was a remonstrance he voiced several times; and once he was so an-noyed by the reiteration of a quor; that he rose in the witness chair as though with intent to end the inquisition by de-

Mr. Spreckels said it was about 18 years ago that he sold his Philadolphia refinery to the trust. He could not rec-ollect with whom he negotiated the sale, but he knew it was not with Mr. Havemeyer, Mr. Scarls or Juhn E. Par-

Havemeyer, Mr. Scarls or Jann E. Far-sons. Mr. Hutchinson asked point blank how much Mr. Spreckels was paid for the plant, but Mr. Morrison instructed him he need not tell, and he did not. Mr. Hutchinson asked: "At the time you carried on the negotiations which resulted in the sale of your Philadelphila plant and the formation of the Western Sugar Refining company, was there any agreement that you would not build another refinery in the cast?" "No." said Mr. Spreckels. "we had no such agreement. I would never sell. myself in that manner." "You were fighting the American Su-gar Refining company in the cast?" "I was, Whenever there are two re-fineries in one field they will ury to sell their sugar wherever they can and get as much for it as they can. That is what I mean by fighting."
