Denver, Colo., July 1.-What is re garded as the very latest indication that Mr. Bryan does not contemplate changing his position on the injunction question to meet the ideas of the con servatives, was brought to town today by Frank S. Monett, Republican attor ney-general of Chio from 1896 to 1900 Mr. Monett was in conference with Mr. Bryan at Lincoln yesterday as the result of which he says he will have Mr. Bryan's endorsement in appearing be fore the resolutions committee of the convention to state the legal and poli-tical reasons why the injunction plank should pledge the Democratic party to amendment of the law in these three particulars:

"First, to prevent the issuing of the writ in industrial disputes except after notice to defendants and full hearing; second, to permit trial before a judge other than the one who issued the writ; and, third, to allow a jury to be summoned in all cases where the alleged contempt is committed outside the presence of the court."

That Mr. Bryan has heretofore taken his stand on an injunction plank containing these elements is the statement today of Mr. Monett and the fact that Mr. Bryan requested Mr. Monett to urge their acceptance by the resolutions committee is taken by the Ohioan to mean that Mr. Bryan will be satisfied with nothing less.

Having recently been the legislative attorney in Ohio for the Brotherhoods of Railway Conductors, Engineers and Firemen, as well as having close contact with labor's views through his legal connection with the miners and brickmakers in the Hocking Valley strike of last February, Mr. Monett said today that he informed Mr. Bryan that Roosevelt's 250,000 majority from the industrial districts in Ohio and 500,000 in Pennsylvania was given because labor believed President Roosevelt was with them, particularly on the injunction demand. This "independent vote," as Mr. Monett named it today, would, he said, surely go to an independent candidate should one be put on the field, in the event the Democratic party falled to pledge itself in positive language on this question. Mr. Monett, however, is of the opinion that while the labor element of the country is asking for notice, jury trial and hearing before another court, the question of notice is the vital part of the issue, and that assurance of this much of the demand by the Democrats would be more nearly satisfactory to labor be more nearly satisfactory to labor than is the declaration of the Chicago

HISTORY OF ISSUE.

In complying with this request, Mr. Monett said today he contemplated going fully into the legal history of the question as well as the political. Mr. Taft is on record in response to this letter and this response was received with great enthusiasm by the miners of Ohio and Pennsylvania, and accounts for the Taft delegates from those districts. The response stated that the secretary was in favor of restoring the federal statute as it existed prior to 1874; that he recognized that as the law now stands, an attorney for a coal mining company, a railroad company or other large corporation having industrial complaint could make such a strong ex parte affidavit, complying with all the necessary and legal requirements, as to entitle him to an immediate injunction without notice, and there was nothing left for an honest court to do but comply with the statute and grant the temporary injunction. In this the secretary further had caused great injustice in many instances to the employes who had no day in court prior to the issuing of the injunction, and were wholly without knowledge that the injunction had been issued until they were haled into court on contempt proceedings."

Mr. Monett appears to be thoroughly impresed with the importance of the injunction issue, and predicts that it has already become the vital question for the consideration of the Democratic convention.

Mr. Monett explained that his trip to Denver was on his own account and at his own expense.

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MEXICAN TROUBLE MUCH EXAGGERATED

According to a Statement by Secretary of Foreign Affairs Fredrico Gamboa.

MALCONTENTS INSIGNIFICANT

in No Instance Have Attacking Parties Been Led by a Representative Man.

Mexico City, July 1 .- A statement nade to the Associated Press today on behalf of the Mexican state department by Secy. of Foreign Affairs Frederic Jamboa, is as follows:

"In order that the absurdly exaggerand order that the absurdly exagger-ated reports regarding the recent trou-ble in northern Mexico may be corrected and in compliance with your request, I am giving you access to certain official correspondence, which will prove that the contention of the Mexican state de-partment that the recent troubles had no present significance, are well grounded."

A number of telegrams and official documents were thereupon shown the correspondent of the Associated Press, which set forth the following facts:

"That the recent attacks upon the villages of Viesca, Las Vacas and Palomas were made by small bands of malcontents, who were driven to deeds of desperation by lack of work, consequent hunger, and an enmity toward the local officials. These men had been furnished literature of an anarchistic and inflammatory nature by Mexicans in Los Angeles, San Antonio, Tex., Austin, Tex., and St. Louis. In no instance had a representative man led the attacking parties, nor had the largest group of raiders numbered more than 60 men, and that the trouble was practically over."

"As you have seen, these attacks have been made on villages near the tion, dizziness or nervous prostration.

Continuing, Mr. Gamboa said:

"As you have seen, these attacks have been made on villages near the boundary line which separates the United States and Mexico, by small groups of unemployed and ignorant men of the lower class.

"It seems that some of them came from the United States and entered the conspiracies. For that reason Mexico maintains that all of the raiders are guilty of common crimes and those caught on Mexican soil will be tried for such, while those apprehended in the United States, Mexico will ask their extradition as we would of any criminal guilty of the crime of arson, murder or robbery.

"Mexico, taken completely unawares by the attacks, asked the co-operation of the United States in preserving the neutrality laws. The government and the people feel deeply grateful for the manner in which the co-operation has been given, though the trouble is of such minor significance. That is the plain truth regarding the revolutionary movement."
