BOTH ARE IN THE HOSPITAL. They Were Making a Run to a Fire

When Accident Occurred-Driver's

Condition is Critical Today. While riding on a fire wagon to the

cene of a fire late Saturday night, Capt. William F. Cahoon and Driver Fred Gulbranson were injured by a failing tree, and both had to be taken to the hospital. The blaze was on east to the hospital. Gulbranson was struck in the back and Cahoon re-ceived a blow across his legs. They were unable to extricate themselves. They were taken to the Salt Lake Private hospital, and today are resting as easily as possible under the circumstances, though Mr, Gulbranson's condition is considered extremely crit-ical, inasmuch as it is believed that his lang was pierced by a broken rib. The leaf-organs lately studied by T.

Jamison, of Aberdeen, indicate that all plants-and not merely the leguminous ones having root-nodules-derive nous ones having root-nodules—derive some of their nitrogen directly from the air. The microscope well shows these organs on Spergula arvensis, the common weed cornspury, where they appear as short, blunt, trans-versely-divided, upright hairs; and in early development the highest seg-ment of each hair is found to contain greenish chiorphyl-like matter separ-ated from the air by only a very deli-cate film. It was conclusively proven that these green tips—absorbing at-mospheric nitrogen—are manufactor-ies of albumen. Different stages were seen to correspond with the age of the hair, some tips revealing the beginning

hair, some tips revealing the beginning of the process, others being gorged with albumen, while still older hairs

with albumen, while still older hairs were discharging the albuminous mat-ter through the lower sections. A cir-cular space surrounding the segments receives a continuous in-flow of the liquid albuminous matter, which passes onward into the internal chan-nels of the leaf. The organs were found in many other plants, wild and cultivated, including the chickweed, found in many other plants, wild and cultivated, including the chickweed, nettle, turning rape, potato, beet, car-rot, lettuce, chicory, tobacco, geran-ium, petunia, balm, daisy, holly and pine. Owing to the abundance of these organs for taking up air nitro-gen, the turnip, the bean family and other highly nitrogenous dicotyledons require little farm yard manure. On the other hand, the cultivated mon-ocotyledons, such as cereals and grasses, have few of the leaf organs, and urgently need nitrogenous manand urgently need nitrogenous man-
