Shorter Working Hours and Better

Pay Among the Demands. Chicago, April 13.-The Tribune says: The first move in what is likely to be a bitter fight between the International association of Machinists and several of the railroads entering Chicago, has been made in demands by the asso tion on the Chicago Great Western railroad. The demands call for a minimum scale of 29 cents an hour, shortening of the work day from ten to nine hours and regulating the apprentice system. The officials of the railroad ompany are expected to make a reply within the next few days. If they re-fuse to comply with the demands of the union all of the 200 machinists in the employ of the company, the ma-jority of whom are employed in the shops at Oelwein, Iowa, will, it is said, be called out
