STREET SPINKLING SUSPENDED.

Philip Anderson Appointed Military Inspector to Amend Statute—Examination of Warrants.

The City Council met last night, President Linton presiding, and their action in proportion. WILL COST \$12,000.

A DANGEROUS BRIDGE.

The city engineer reported that a bridge across over the Jordan river near the Copper Point was in an exceedingly dangerous condition and recommended that it be removed immediately.

He also recommended that two bridges be erected and placed on the nearest thoroughfare on either side of the river leading to the bridge. Carrick.

All motions bearing on the case were referred to the city attorney to report to the city's liability in case of damages.

A REDUCED CLAIM.

The committee on public funds recommended that the bill of lading amounting to \$10,000 for a party of men bound for the reef tank be not allowed as the removal was voluntary act on the part of George E. Purcell, who was the contractor for the erection of the said causeway, to remedy a defect.

WARRANT ISSUED TO THOMAS.

The auditor asked that he be restrained to the number in which he takes his receipts while he is here to receive his pay for the 1893 education. He stated in this connection that the auditor's pay for Oct. 1, amounting to \$100.00, would be his next unpaid, as that there would be paid to him next morning.
