KENTUCKY.
Verdict of Guilty—\$16,000 Fine.
LOUISVILLE.—The jury found a verdict of guilty against Jno. Smith for killing Geo. Off, in July, '67.

NEW YORK.
Embarrassment—Fifteenth Amendment—The vote on Hoar's Nomination—\$250,000—Free-Attempt to assassinate the Prince is denied.

NEW YORK, 4.—An assistant in the City Clerk's office Newark, N. J., has embezzled twenty thousand dollars and fled to California.

It is announced that at an early day an official proclamation of the ratification of the 15th Amendment will be made by the Secretary of State.

The American anti-slavery society will hold a fitting commemorative meeting in this city.

A special dispatch from Washington says of the action of the executive session of the Senate yesterday, in the nomination of Hoar to the Supreme Bench, all the Southern Senators, except Warner of Alabama, and Gilbert of Florida voted in the negative.

Williams, of Oregon, was the only Senator from the Pacific coast who voted yes, both of the New York Senators voted nay; also all the Democrats. Morton was not present, but would have voted yes. Sherman was also absent. It is not definitely known whether it is Hoar's present intention to remain in the Cabinet.

A great fire at Towanda on Saturday evening, caused a loss of a quarter of a million.

Rumors reached the police last night of an attempt to be made on the life of Prince Arthur. The officer detailed to watch the Prince's party as they proceeded from the Brevoort House to the residence of Judge Stoughton, in the Fifth Avenue and Seventeenth St., found a party of ruffians stationed near the Brevoort House. When the officer approached they drew revolvers and told him to leave. The officer got reinforcement and returned and attacked the ruffians. After a severe fight, the police arrested Wm. Murphy, Pat. Mulhede, Charles Gardiner, John Lough and Michael McNulty. Lough is an Englishman and Gardiner a native Yorker. The party refused to make any explanation of their conduct and were arraigned at the police court this morning on the charge of assaulting the officers; but there was not sufficient proof to establish the charge of a design upon the Prince's life. They were committed.

Later.—There is no truth in the report of the attempt to assassinate Prince Arthur. Several arrests have been made. The Prince's friends deny the correctness of the story. The men under arrest profess to know nothing of it.

PENNSYLVANIA.
Horace Bannery Dead.
PHILADELPHIA.—Horace Bannery Jr. President of the Union League Club and a distinguished lawyer, died to-day after a brief illness.

WASHINGTON.
Hear Rejected.—Cause of the Gold Panic.
Washington Sinking.

WASHINGTON.—Senate in executive session took action on the nomination of Hoar, as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. One report says he was rejected by the vote; but a more reliable statement is that the Senate, by a vote of yeas 21 to nays 33 refused to take the nomination from the table. This action is considered equivalent to rejection. There was no debate. The Senate confirmed Henry Carpenter as postmaster of Hamilton, Nevada. W. Wood, U. S. Attorney, Nevada.

In the vote on Merrill's amendment to the naval deficiency bill, Casserly, Cole, and Williams voted in the negative; Woodstock for the government.

Washington seems to be sinking, it is hardly possible he will recover.

Specials say that the gold conspiracy committee have traced the circumstances connected with the transmission of Secy. Boutwell's dispatch to sell four millions in gold, which broke the market. It was not in cipher, and was filed at the branch office, near the Treasury, where at this office it connects with all the hotels and branch offices, so that all could hear the message when it was sent to New York over the broker's line which connects with the gold room; The Baltimore gold room and Exchange Board of Brokers and other similar offices at New York, where the message could be heard fifteen minutes before it reached Gen. Butterfield.

MISSOURI.
Fatal Affray.
ST. JOSEPH.—In a quarrel last Thursday night, H. L. Church, a conductor on the St. Joseph and Council Bluffs Railroad, shot and instantly killed Michael Calligan.

An old feud in Rushville, culminated on Tuesday in a fight, which resulted in the death of two brothers, named Hart.

MASSACHUSETTS.
Big Fire—Explosion.
WEST AMESBURY.—Sargent's wheel story and three adjoining buildings were burned last night. Loss \$40,000.

LOWELL.—There was an explosion of a church festival to-night. Considerable damage was done to the organ building. Two persons were seriously injured.

VIRGINIA.
Judge Impeached.
WHEELING.—The Senate has concurred in the House resolution to impeach Judge Harrison of the Seventh Judicial district.

INDIANA.
Boiler Explosion.
INDIANAPOLIS.—A boiler in Linker and Company's machine shop, exploded on Saturday morning. The engineers were badly injured and two or three slightly hurt.

FOREIGN NEWS.
GREAT BRITAIN.
The business before Parliament—The Telegraph Muddle—The Irish Land Bill.

LONDON.—The Saturday Review predicts that the Irish land question and the bill for regulating the ballot and the diffusion of education will engross the attention of Parliament at the coming session.

Extraordinary scenes are occurring at the telegraph offices throughout England. The dissatisfaction is universal, complaints of delay and errors have been greatly multiplied since the new arrangements went into effect. In this city particularly, crowds of people surround the offices and there is the utmost confusion.

It is reported that the Cabinet has settled upon a land bill for Ireland. The new bill proposes to give security to the tenant by confirming and assuring the same rights to tenants as are held under the best customs of the Province of Ulster. It refers disputes concerning improvements on the land by the tenant and the amount of rent thereon to a tribunal, with the power of summary jurisdiction.

ITALY.
The Ecclesiastical Council.
ROME.—Another session of the Ecclesiastical Council was held yesterday. The Archbishop of Turin celebrated mass. The committee on "Faith" has completed the greater part of its work. The Council now consists of seven hundred and sixty members. The Archbishop of Smyrna celebrated mass in a public congregation to-day. The death of bishop Leseda is announced.

FRANCE.
Fourteen Persons Killed.
MARSEILLES.—Two houses fell this morning, burying fourteen persons in the ruins. Two bodies have been recovered.
