She finds no trace of him in the home, which is empty, and she is looking for him. ## THE WANDERING JEW.

Subject of an Address by Rabbi Freund Last Evening.

In his address last evening on the "Wandering Jew," Rabbi Freund said: "The world is evidencing its willingness to give the Jew a fair hearing. This being so we may fittingly ask: 'Do you think that the Jew in the world is the embodiment of curse? If so, is it a curse to present mankind with the noblest outpourings of the soul and with the grandest thoughts that well to expression on human lips? Is it a curse to give to mankind the pattern for pure domestic life, despite the obstacles placed on life's road? Is it a curse to suffer unmercifully the barbarities of inhuman mankind? Is it a curse that has been one of the grandest systems of government under which men have ever privileged to live take its root and growth from the Jews' effort at government? If this and more be curse, then the wandering Jew is willing to continue in the world, ready to be a sacrifice on the altar of service, exclaiming ever the words of faith, 'Thy will, not ours, be done.'"
