## THE WANDERING JEW.

Subject of an Address by Rabbi Freund Last Evening.

In his address last evening on the "Wandering Jew," Rabbi Freund said: "The world is evidencing its willingness to give the Jew a fair hearing. This being so we may fittingly ask: "Do you think that the Jew in the world is the embodiment of curse?" If so, is it a curse to present mankind with the noblest outpourings of the soul and with the grandest thoughts that well to expression on human lips? Is it curse to give to man-kind the pattern for pure domestic life, despite the obstacles placed on life's road? Is it curse to suffer unwaveringly the barbarities of inhuman mankind? Is it curse that has been one of the grandest systems of government under which men were ever privileged to live take its root and growth from the Jews' effort at gov-ernment?
