The bill introduced by Senator Plumb to provide for issuance of silver bullion, authorizes and directs the Secretary of the Treasury to receive silver bullion at the mint and assay offices in sums of not less than \$1,000, and to issue therefore as depositors may elect, standard silver dollars or silver certificates. The coinage of standard silver dollars or certificates is prohibited from and after the passage of this bill, until the amount of such standard silver dollars in the Treasury shall equal the per cent. of silver certificates issued and outstanding and shall then be resumed, but only such an amount shall be required to preserve that proportion between standard silver dollars in the Treasury and silver certificates outstanding.

The proposition that a delegate from Alaska be admitted, has caused some inquiry touching the population there. Prof. Elliott of the Smithsonian Institute puts the population at 30,000, of which 400 are whites and 1,700 Russian halfbreeds, and the remainder Indians. Prospecting for minerals has not indicated any great value. The timber will be very valuable in time; also the fisheries when developed. The fur trade is the sole means of livelihood for the people. The government's revenue from the fur trade was \$317,000 last year.


