WASHINGTON, 20.—Plumb introduced in the Senate to-day, a bill repealing that part of the act which provides that certain railroads con-

Farley, from the committee on pensions, reported adversely on the bill to increase the pensions of the wounded soldiers of the war of 1812, and one bill in relation to the compensation and expenses of pension agents; indefinitely postponed.
