

FEARFUL BUTCHERY FOLLOWS MUTINY

Schooner Harry A. Berwind Arrives in Southport. Her Decks and Cabins all Stained With Blood.

STORIES OF TROUBLE CONFLICT

Five Men, Including Captain, Killed, Members of Crew Accusing Each Other.

Wilmington, N. C., Oct. 12.—Her decks and cabins splashed with blood from the fearful butchery following the mutiny aboard the ship early Tuesday morning off the North Carolina coast, the four masted schooner Harry A. Berwind of Philadelphia was towed into Southport today by Wilmington tugs.

Aboard were the prize crew of the New York schooner Blanche H. King, who were wanted as witnesses against the three negroes shackled and brought to the cape near quarantine station on Wednesday, charged with mutiny and murder.

At the preliminary investigation before United States Commissioner Collier of Wilmington, and Pinner of Southport today, the men who boarded the Berwind told the story of conditions on the vessel as they found them, and the three prisoners were then introduced at their own request.

They gave their names as Robert Sawyer, Henry Scott and Arthur Adams, all negroes, and under 40 years of age. Sawyer and Adams employed counsel, and both charged that Scott did the killing of the five men, with the exception of Capt. Rumrill, who disappeared before daylight Tuesday morning in a manner of which they knew nothing.

Each said he saw Scott shoot the mate on the lee side of the ship and throw his body overboard. Then he killed the engineer and went down the companionway. Very soon they heard shots below deck in the galley, and a short while thereafter Scott came up again, bearing the body of the cook, a small white man, in his arms, depositing his burden over the rail. They afterward bound Scott and were steering the vessel at best they could until overhauled by the Blanche H. King.

Scott says all the seamen, four negroes, formed a conspiracy soon after leaving Mobile, Sept. 27, feeling outraged because of short rations. He said he killed no one except Cokely, the negro seaman found on deck, and that he killed him in self-defense. Cokely, he claimed, hit him with a stick and shot at him while he was bound. He attempted no explanation of why he had been bound, except that his companions wanted to get rid of him after the trouble. He said he saw Cokely shoot the mate and went down the companionway. He does not know how the cook was killed, as the shooting was below deck.

Scott is a mulatto, and is most intelligent of the four; Adams is also a mulatto, and claims to be a British subject from St. Vincent island. All three negroes were held without bail, and are confined in the Southport jail for the federal court in Wilmington in November. Three members of the crew of the schooner Blanche H. King are held as witnesses, but will give bond upon the arrival of the vessel's owner tomorrow morning.

Upon her arrival in port the Berwind had lost her foremost topmast, her rudder was disabled and she was leaking slightly. She had a cargo of lumber.

REBELLION HOTTESTOTS. They Have Captured the Jerusalem Camp Near Warmbad.

Cape Town, Cape Colony, Oct. 12.—Morongo and Morris, chiefs of the rebellious Hantoots of German Southwest Africa, have captured Jerusalem Camp between Warmbad and Keitum, after a seven-day fighting, during which Lieut. Surman and five men were killed and eight men were wounded. The Hantoots, numbering about 1,000, captured the stock and stores. Several Germans were made prisoners, but after being disarmed were allowed to return to Keitum. Von Trotha, commander of the German forces, with a letter from Morongo saying that the Hantoots were not to be fought at Keitum, hearing that Morongo was in the vicinity, burned their stores, deserted their post and retired to Deconodum. The garrison Nkasa has been strengthened by 600 men and a battery of artillery.

Two Men Badly Sealed.

Norfolk, Va., Oct. 12.—Michael Marra, chief waiter, and Patrick Sauterbury, second class fireman on the United States torpedo boat Stockton, are at the Norfolk naval hospital seriously sealed, as the result of an accident on the Stockton while that vessel was out from this yard on a five days' cruise.

The men were in the forenoon when a tug boat out of the yard came alongside both to be sealed by the dry steam. Marra may die. Sauterbury's injuries are less serious. The Stockton was little injured.

One Legged Negro Lynched.

Elkton, Ky., Oct. 12.—Shortly after midnight a mob supposed to have come from Trenton took Frank Leavell, a one-legged negro, out of the jail here and lynched him in a nearby woods. Leavell attempted to enter the room of a young woman at Trenton last Saturday.

Discount Rate Unchanged.

London, Oct. 12.—The rate of discount of the Bank of England remains unchanged today at 4 per cent.

NO FEDERATION WITH UNITARIANS

Neither They, Universalists, Nor Roman Catholics Were Invited to Inter-Church Conference.

INVITATIONS WERE LIMITED.

Rev. Dr. Minot J. Savage Says That Was Consistent, but it is Rather Late to Have Such Ideals.

New York, Oct. 12.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the inter-church conference on federation here today it was decided to make public the correspondence out of which has grown the discussion of the subject of the exclusion of the Unitarian denomination from the conference. The inter-church conference will be held in this city in November. The American Unitarian association, the national organization of the denomination, elected three delegates to attend the conference, namely: Rev. Edward Hale, chaplain of the United States senate; ex-Secy. of the Navy John D. Long of Massachusetts; and Dr. Samuel A. Eliot, who is a son of President Eliot of Harvard.

Members of the executive committee, which was presided over by the Rev. W. H. Roberts of Philadelphia, declared the original letter of invitation was not sent to the Unitarians, Universalists or Roman Catholics. Neither of the latter two denominations, it was asserted, has taken any action in the matter.

The correspondence given out included the original letter of invitation and the text of letters received from Dr. Eliot of the proposed Unitarian delegation and Dr. E. B. Sanford, secretary of the National Federation of Churches, who is acting for the inter-church conference.

Dr. Eliot declared it was impossible for him to believe that the coming conference would exclude representatives of the churches that stand peculiarly for the separation of principle in American religious life. Dr. Eliot called attention to the personnel of the Unitarian delegation, saying that ex-Secy. Long and Dr. Hale were among the most beloved and trusted of Christian leaders.

Replying to this letter, Secy. Sanford wrote: "The committee on correspondence feels constrained to limit to some extent the sending out of invitations to denominational bodies asking them to appoint delegates to the coming inter-church conference on federation. This action was taken after very serious consideration, and I am confident that the committee would decline to reopen the discussion of the matter. I need scarcely add that this decision was in no way personal."

"Surely there are few persons in our American life whom we all delight to honor more than those you mention. Your regret cannot be more sincere than that of the committee on correspondence that the way did not seem clear to invite your national association to appoint delegates to the conference."

It was stated today that the letter of Dr. Sanford had been formally approved by the executive committee. Dr. Roberts made the following statement about the matter:

"The invitations to the conference were issued to churches which it was felt were in sufficient agreement with one another to secure efficient results in the line of federation. The Unitarian churches were omitted from the list. The work of issuing the invitations and organizing the conference has been under way for two years. There is no purpose to antagonize the church, but to bring together for the discussion of plans of co-operation such churches as are now in close Christian fellowship and for the attainment of great moral and spiritual ends."

The conference represents 18,000,000 communicants and at least 50,000,000 adherents of the distinctly Protestant and Evangelical groups of Christian churches. Unitarians do not belong to this group. This is a sufficient reason why they were not invited. We respect highly the gentlemen appointed by the Unitarians as delegates, but do not feel that their presence in the conference would be helpful to the interests involved."

MINOT J. SAVAGE SPEAKS.

New York, Oct. 12.—Rev. Dr. Minot J. Savage of the Church of the Messiah, Unitarian, said today that the executive committee of the inter-church conference on federation which is to be held in this city next month, were as consistent in voting to exclude representatives of the Unitarians from the conference as were the Catholics who burned Protestants and Protestants who murdered Catholics in the middle ages.

"That such an action has been taken caused no surprise," he said, "because that a belief in the divinity of Christ is all important to salvation are at least consistent in excluding us from their work of saving mankind. This we have to admit. They are inconsistent just as were Catholics in the middle ages. Disbelief meant eternal ruin, therefore cut it out, root and branch; kill the body if necessary, but check its spread. It was consistent, was it not? But don't you think it is rather late to be living up to such ideals of consistency?"

"And even consistency itself gets muddled now and then, as for instance, in the treatment accorded to our Unitarian young men in the Y. M. C. A. That organization is anxious that they should come in; it takes their money but in return it is forced by its consistent purpose to deny them the vote in its affairs that is given to young men of other churches."

DR. MACKAY'S VIEW.

Dr. Donald Sage Mackay, a member of the executive committee of the inter-church federation, said of the exclusion:

"Such action could not properly be taken by such a body as this inter-church federation. It is not a legislative body. It has not even a substitute committee to pass on doctrinal qualifications. It simply is a body which has invited Christian churches to send representatives to discuss methods of spreading still further the Gospel of righteousness."

"The Unitarians say they are Christians and desire to join in the work. What can any such conference as this do but take their word for it and admit them? Lots of us accept them as Christians; I know that I do, most emphatically."

"Many of us feel deeply the debt we

HUGH WATT'S CASE.

Sensation Caused by Withdrawal of Cattleman's Evidence.

London, Oct. 12.—Today's proceedings in the case of Hugh Watt, the former member of parliament, who is charged with attempting to bribe a private detective named Marshall to assist him in murdering Watt's wife, were marked by the sensational withdrawal by the cattleman, Norman Battle, of the evidence which he gave Sept. 22. On that occasion Battle declared that he overheard a conversation between Marshall and another man in which Marshall was threatened. Battle today said his real name was Lightfoot and that Watt, who was accompanied by a man describing himself as an equerry of King Edward, met the witness in Hyde park Aug. 24, and informed him that the king wished the case to be withdrawn. At Watt's dictation Battle, (or Lightfoot), wrote a letter to Watt's lawyers saying he could clear Watt.

The latter also dictated the evidence which the witness gave Sept. 22. Battle added that he had received about \$200 from Watt and the equerry was advised to go to Canada and was promised \$2,000 and a government position for life.

Neal Dow's Daughter Dead.

Portland, Me., Oct. 12.—Miss Cornelia M. Dow, a well known worker in the field of charity, philanthropy and reform, died at her home in this city today, aged 63 years. She had held various offices in the state and national W. C. T. U. She was the daughter of the late Gen. Neal Dow.
