At Lewiston, Cache County, Utah, May 27, 1879, CAROLINE GAESEN, wife of Charles Price, deceased, formerly the wife of Richard Blakey.

She was born in the parish of York, Herefordshire, England, September 2nd, 1819; was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day saints in the year 1840, by Elder Willard Woodruff, emigrated to Utah in 1846, crossed the Plains with the handcart. On that tedious journey she lost her husband and one child. She bore a strong testimony to the truth of the gospel to the last. She leaves two children, and three more that she was truly a mother to, and a large circle of friends to mourn her

At East Jordan, on the 7th inst., being dragged to death by a horse, J. H. WILSON, son of Samuel and Mary Wilson Worthington, aged 9 years, 8 months and 21 days.

At Willard City, Box Elder County, July 31st 1879, of diphtheria, JANE, the beloved daughter of Benjamin and Mary Jones, aged 9 years and 3 days. Deceased was a bright and intelligent child.

OBITUARY.

Died, of congestive chills, at the residence of her son, in Fillmore City, Millard County, N.Y., July 31st, 1879, MARRIET, relict of Seymour Brunson, and daughter of Wm. B. Gould and Hilda Gilmore.

Born August 2nd, 1802, in Hector, Seneca County, N.Y. She was baptized by Hyrum Smith in 1831, and moved with her husband to Jackson County in 1836, being among those who suffered persecution at the hands of Missourians. They moved to Far West in 1837, and finally, with the rest of the Saints, left the state of Missouri in February 1839, and moved to Quincy, Ill.; finally settling at Nauvoo, Hancock County, where her husband died in 1840. Seymour Brunson held the office of colonel in the Nauvoo Legion, and was a member of the High Council. He was buried with military honors.

In the year 1841, Sister Brunson was married to John Elmer. She had five children by her first husband and two by her second. They moved to Council Bluffs in 1846, and arrived in Salt Lake City in the fall of 1851. Since arriving in the valleys of the mountain, she lived at Provo and Payson until Brother Elmer died, and has since resided with her son, Lewis Brunson, in Fillmore. There are but few now living who have passed through the same or similar trying scenes of persecution, privation and hardship, for the Gospel's sake, as has Sister Brunson. She had the satisfaction of going to the Temple at St. George, and performing the ordinances for her self and for some of her dear friends, and has died in full faith of the Gospel and a firm hope of a glorious resurrection.
