leaving 4478,286,400 or this year's output to be sold in addition to a large carry-over from the previous year. The rail-roads have applied in six months for 3079,446,600, exclusive or \$252,000,000 nn-nounced by the Hill roads and St. Paul last December, Industrial needs have been leas pressing, yet not so light as the total of \$299,781,900 would indicate.

The most prominent feature of 1907 financing to date has been the unpre-cedentedly heavy offerings of short

notes paying very generous returns to investors-from 5 to 8 per cent, and in exceptional cases, even more. Alto-gether \$608,651,000 of this form of se-curities has been put out.
