# CASE DECIDED AGAINST CLARK.

Was in Error When He Refused To Turn Over His Records To City Recorder.

#### OPINION OF SUPREME COURT.

Decision of District Judge Stewart is Affirmed and Unanimously Concurred In.

The decision of District Judge Stewart in the case of J. O. Nystrom, city recorder and ex-officio clerk of the city court, against Frank H. Clark, justice of the peace for Salt Lake City, has been upheld by the Supreme court in an opinion handed down yesterday afternoon. The action was a mandamus suit brought to compel Justice Clark to turn over the records and docket of his former office of justice of the peace for the First precinct.

Mr. Clark was justice of the peace for the First precinct and then the Legislature consolidated all of the justice precincts of the city into one, after which Clark was elected city justice. He refused to turn over the records of his former office to Recorder Nystrom on the ground that he was his own successor and hence entitled to keep the rec-ords and docket. Judge Stewart de-cided in favor of City Recorder Ny-strom, whereupon Justice Clark appealed to the Supreme court and the judgment of the lower court was affirmed by the latter court. The opinion of the court was written by Justice McCarty and concurred in by Chief Inc. Carty and concurred in by Chief Jus-tice Baskin and Justice Bartch. Water rights case follow case decided

#### WATER RIGHTS CASE. Court Decides in Favor of Richards Irri-

gation Company, Defendants. The supreme court has affirmed the

judgment in the lower court in the case of B. H. Cole and J. M. Thomas, appellants, against the Richards Irri-gation company et al. The action was brought in this county to quiet was brought in this county to quiet title to certain water rights and reservoir sites in several lakes in Little Cottonwoood canyon. It was alleged by plaintiffs that they had the right to build dams and store all the surplus waters of the lakes and also to lower the outlets and drain the lakes of their natural supply of water as well. Judge Hall, who tried the case in the lower court, decided in favor of defendants. The supreme court, in an opinion written by Justice McCarty and concurred in by Chief Justice Baskin and Justice Bartch, affirms that judgment.

#### JUDGMENT REVERSED. Lower Court Erred and Garf Case is Therefore Remanded.

In the case of the Western Loan Savings company against Louis and Amelia S. Garf, appellants, the supreme court has reversed the judgment of the lower court and remanded the case to the court below to allow defendants judgment for the difference between the value of certain stocks, given to plaintiff as security for a promissory note, and the accumulations thereof. The action was brought to recover on a promissory note for \$1,600. The note was at first secured by a deed to some real estate and afterwards defendants turned over to plaintiff some stock as security. The stock appreciated in value but when suit was brought to foreclose on the note, the lower court refused to give defendants judgment for the accumulated value of the stock. This judgment is reversed as stated


