We learn from Doctor Don C.
Roberts of a painful if not serious accident, which happened to a son of Wm. Faucett, of Tintic, at Jordan bridge on yesterday morning. The boy was teaming for his father and had camped for the night at Jordan bridge, near Lehi, loaded with 3500 lbs. In the morning stepping on the double tree he slipped and fell, the whole load passing over him. One rib was broken and he was otherwise terribly lacerated about the hip and face. The Doctor says he will recover unless there are internal injuries which have not as yet been developed.

## Diptheria.

The general prevalence of dip-theria throughout the country this season and malignancy of the ex-isting tpye makes it a matter of im-portance to have all available infor-mation in regard to its prevention or cure spread before the public. The practical conclusions arrived at by the Public Health Associa-tion of New York, (where the dip-theria has reached the rank of an epidemic.) are as follows:

epidemic,) are as follows:

"1. If diptheria has gained a foothold in any city or populous neighborhood, it selects certain localities in which its persistence is specially marked, and its persistence, as shown by repeated outbreaks or continued prevalence, seems to hold an important relation to certain conditions of soil, drainage, and sanitary wants of dwellings, which admit of preventive measures.

"2. The extension of the disease from one individual to another and to entire households or families, and from family to family, and from place to place, are facts so well proved in the history of the disease that the entire separation of the ick from the well, at least of children sick with this disease from all thers, should be regarded as a first-

rate sanitary duty.
"3. That the immediate sanitary as well as perfect medical care of every family exposed to it seems to be a duty required by every consid eration of humanity and public That diptheria is net a new disease, and that its recent modes of revalence are not new or in any

ease, and that its recent modes of prevalence are not new or in any manner unusual, is clearly proved by the medical writings of the best observers of disease. While in Europe the records of this malady extend back to the very dawning of scientific medicine, and through the last four centuries its fatal prevalence has been vividly described under various names, and its persistence and fatality have been entered in the historical records of numerous places over a vast range, from the Mediterranean to the North Sea, the history of diptheria as the "putrid sore threat," the "malignant angina," the "angina suffocativa," &c., has been written in various places in America from early colonial times.
