New York, Sept, 24.--A case of epilep-sy, heretofore considered an incurable disease is responding to X-ray treat-ment at a hospital in this city. Fat westerns sold mostly from \$4.00 to \$4.65, she stuff \$2.25 to \$2.25 largely, with some sales of heifers on up to \$3.55. Western stock-ers and feeders brought \$3.00 to \$3.76. A drove of 938 pound New Mexican feed-ers sold Wednesday at \$3.40, and some Colorado 1,000 pound steers brought \$3.75 same day. Choice light veal calves sold higher, and brought up to \$6.00.
