son who sells or disposes of for gain any intoxicating drink without obexecute a bond with two sureties, one of the conditions of which is that he will pay all damages, fines, and forfeltures that may be adjudged against him under the provisions of the liquor act. "Sec. 6. Any person licensed as atoresaid, who shall sell, give away or otherwise dispose of any, intoxicating drink at any time daring the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, smeepf for medical purposes upon the prescription of a physician, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and apon conviction thereof, may be fined in any sum less than one hundred dol-

Now if the parties who fare dealing out liquor to the public are not licensed, the county authorities are to The letter is anonymous, which fact of blame for not proceeding against them. If they are 1 censed, then the county authorities will be to blame if they do not proceed against them for violating the Sunday law. Newspaper notices encouraging this violation of the Sabbath by lauding and giving prominence to the Sunday concerts, mention that no liquor will be 'sold while" the concerts are in progress.
