# MOVEMENT. Intense Feeling Against English in Cape Colony. ASSUMING DANGEROUS SIZE. Situation Declared to be Graver Than at Any Time During the War-

ANTI-BRITISH

Vigorous Action Wanted.

London, Nov. 28 .- The Daily Mail publishes this morning the following larmist dispatch from Capetown: "The anti-British feeling in Cape Colony is assuming dangerous proportions, owing to false stories spread of British barbarity in Orange River colony and the Transvaal. Loyalists feel that the Dutch congress next week will be the signal for a rising, and they demand that martial law be proclaimed throughout the colony. The situation is declared to be graver than at any previous time during the war." Referring editorially to its Capetown advices, the Daily Mail adopts a most serious tone, asserting that the anti-British movement is accentuated by the withdrawal of troops from Cape Colony, and calling for vigorous action by the British government.

Lake City, Fla., Nov. 27 .- Spencer Williams, a negro, was shot to death near this city today by a mob. Williams, who recently arrived here from Pensacola, last night shot and dangerously wounded City Marshal Strange and William Strictland, a business man of this city, while resisting arrest.

As soon as the news of the shooting became known, citizens armed them-selves, and, forming a posse, followed the desperado on horseback and afoot, overtook him today in a swamp, negro was literally shot to pieces, fully 200 bullet holes being found in his body. The body was brought to town and placed in front of the courthouse gate, where it was viewed by hundreds.

#### Miles' Army Reorganization Bill.

Washington, Nov. 28 .- Copies of the letter of Gen. Miles to the secretary of war submitting the draft of a prosed bill for the reorganization of the rmy have been furnished to the military committees of both houses of Con-Gen, Miles favors an army ress. per based on one man for every 1,000 of the population of the country. This will provide for 76,730 men, the army o be made up of fourteen regiments of alpy, fourteen regiments of heavy four regiments of field artilery, and thirty-two regiments of in fantry. In addition to these the bill provides for 5.086 non-combatants. vided as follows: Quartermaster's partment, 1,000 men; subsistence de tment, 500 men; engineer corps, 276 men; ordnance department, 590, ind signal corps, 720 men.

Provision is made for an auxiliary orce of 20,000 men to serve for three rears, unless they are discharged, out.
