COX TALKS OF POOL.

Believes Clean Atmosphere and Games Better Than Hoodlumism.

General Secretary Cox of the Y. M. C. A. has prepared for publication the following statement relative to the playing of pool on association prem-

"Members attending day school under 18 years of age and over 16 may play pool and billiards daily intil 6 p. m., and in addition until 9 o'clock on Friday evenings. All other boys who are in day school and under this age are allowed to play only upon the presentation of a game card bearing the indorsement of the assistant social director, who consults with parents in case of any doubt. All members under 18 who work during the day may play at such hours as they can up to 9:30 p. m., and provided they have a game card. Members attending day school un

game card.

One of the boys who is in court has been a member of the association since 1805, and has for over a year played pool and billiards. He will be 18 years pool and billiards. He will be 18 years of age in March. The second boy has never been a member of the association, and says that he learned to play two years ago in Twin Falls, idaho, and has been in the Y. M. C. A. only once. The third boy has not been a member of the association for three years, but has come to the building a few times in the last few months, he says, as a guest of other boys, and on some of these occasions he played pool or billiards.

Two years ago in company with one of the most prominent educators of the city we counted 75 high school boys in public pool and billiard rooms at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. It seemed that as workers for boys we could not fairly censure the use of these games even under the vicious influence which we found them unless we provided the same games under hepiful influence; consequently, we have so far as our means and space would permit furnished an opportunity for young men and boys to play pool and billiards. It is not claimed that the supervision is perfect, but the arrangement, as now made, is the best that our present knowledge and equipment permit.

What baseball is to the boys of the town in summer, billiards and pool are to them in winter. a boy is found who will admit that he does not know how to play these games. We have not had a half dozen requests for instruction so far. I hope that the time will come when some oraganization of the city will provide facilities where hops under proper gudance may play pool and billiards in an atmosphere of honor and culture.

I am firmly convinced that in dealing with these matters our methods should be directed to the normal desires and activities of boys rather than to repress thom: repression in this regard means hoodlum gangs, river bank caves and broken widows. aves and broken windows
