It is quite likely that during the summer members of the House committee on ways and means and perhaps mem bers of the Sonate finance co will assemble at some convenient place and prepare a bill to amend the war revenue law. This action will be taken n order to have a measure satisfactory to both House and Senate as far as pos sible ready to be put through in the early days of the short session when

Congress reassembles in December. This project is only in the preliminary stages at present, but the suggestion has been made that a nonpartisan bill can be prepared and that Republicans and Democrats upon both committees can take part in its preparation. The men who have the matter under con-sideration believe that if such a measure is prepared the bill can pass both houses before the holiday adjournment of the short session. Usually legisla ion of this kind requires partisan ad tion, and it' may be that the majority party will find that it must frame the legislation modifying the war revenue tax unless some basis of agreemen can be reached with the minority. the conferences will be directed to that

end. WHY THEY PREFER CONGRESS.

I overheard a member of the House telling one of his constituents why man preferred a seat in the House o Representatives rather than a position as a judge of a court at home, although the salaries were the same, and often times the judges receive more than is paid congressmen. More than that these judges are usually elected for a long period of years-from 7 to 12 at least. They do not have to go through a biennial scramble in the political campaign for both nomination and elec-tion. Yet it is a well known fact that many men will leave the bench to come to Congress. Of course it is easy to understand how a man will leave a judgeship to come to the Senate, which is the most desirable place. And often men leave the supreme bench of a State, where they are almost sure of life positions, to take seats in the fenate. But to return to this mem ber who was explaining the matter to his constituent. He said his political his constituent. He said his political life is more pleasant than a judical life. "We have scenes of great excite-ment in the House at times," he said. "especially in political debates. Then the fur flies, so to speak. But more than that, there is the national character which we assume when we become representatives. The life in Washington is fascinating, especially for those who are in official station and have to do with affairs of the government. The humdrum existence of life on the bench may be all right for some, but there are very few of us who would not quickly exchange such a career for one in Congress, even if it is but a sub ordinate one compared to places held by the leaders."




