NEW YORK, 3.—The steamships

NEW YORK, 3.—The *Times* this

NEW ORLEANS, La.—The citizens
of this city, on the 20th, elected a
committee to assist in the war, to
install the Kellogg officers.

The meeting, which was very enthu-
siastic, was addressed by several
of the officers of the Kellogg
association to-day. Resolutions
were adopted endorsing
the Kellogg officers, and
urging the citizens to support
in the collection of taxes.

NEW ORLEANS, La.—All of the
late James Brooks has been admit-
ted to probate. It was executed
April 25th, 1873, and a codicil was
executed on the 20th. It was
to his son James Wilson. Brooks
one-half of the interest in the
Evening Express and the *Express*
Western Division Kansas, and
his Fifth Avenue house and a hun-
dred thousand dollars in land and
bonds of the Union Pacific Rail-
road, on condition that he should
honour her dower right in the per-
sonal and real estate in Park Row,
and the real estate in Virginia,
all his real estate in
Washington, D. C., and
\$1513 F St., also thirty-two one-
thousand and income bonds of the
Western Division Kansas, and
five one-thousand dollars of the first
mortgage bonds on the same road.
To his daughter Mary Nelson five
thousand and income bonds of the
Western Division Kansas, and
one thousand each, and 3,500 in
the St. Louis, Chicago, and
Omaha, and the bonds from the
control of the Union Pacific Rail-
road, Charles H. Nelson,
his twenty-one thousand in the first
mortgage bonds of the Union Pacific
Railroad, on condition that he should
honour his all other property against suits
instituted by the U. S., or other
parties, and that he should not be
sued by his brother, Dr. Geo. W.
Brooks, is divided for the purpose
of paying the mortgages on his home
and other property, personal or
realized, he consents to his son,
James Wilson, and his wife, Mary
Nelson, to be his executor in the
will.

The codicil to the will
makes it a condition that he should
honour the property of his wife,
Mary Nelson, in equal parts, all the taxes

A letter from Mohave City, dated April 19th, tells us that a man named Joseph Spearling shot Captain Charles Atchison, in a quarrel originating about a bottle of whiskey. The victim was killed instantly, and there was some hope of his recovering.

SOMERSET.—Some unknown parties fired at the barkeeper of the Hotel Heron, carried the money safe down the yard, broke it open with a crow bar, and took out \$500 in coin and \$700 in checks. The checks were afterward found in the pockets. A skiff was stolen from the river by some party, which the fishermen went down the river.

SAN DIEGO, 3.—The Union has been informed that the captain of the Indian who shot Vandervoort, near the Camagueir rancho, Lower California. He has been taken under guard, to San Francisco.

The Tucson Citizen, of April 20, makes no mention of new Apache troubles, but says that all is quiet here in the Sonora border line, and that there is strong indication that the policy now pursued will succeed.

OREGON CITY, 3.—Last evening the steamers Shoo Fly and Alice, belonging to the Oregon Steamship company, were captured by the prompt action of the fire department. The hulls of both steamers were holed, and none of the freight lost.

SAN FRANCISCO, 3.—Frank Kennedy was arrested last night for the murder of James Reynolds. Reynolds was stabbed in the throat, and the wound was at first thought probably not serious. His eyes became inflamed, and he died in the hospital. Kennedy fled from the city to avoid the police, and did not return till Thursday.

STOCKTON, 3.—The body of an unknown man, about forty-five years of age, wearing a light colored suit and having a mustache, was discovered at Mokelumne station with his razor cut off. In one hand was a razor and in the other a knife. The coroner ordered a post mortem examination. There was \$100 in his pocket of the deceased.

The governor has authorized participation in the target shooting yesterday. Colonel T. R. Hook won the prize, and made him the honor. Governor Booth sent the leather medal.

EUROPEAN.

VENICE, 3.—The Emperor gave a magnificent banquet at the Grand Canal, among the guests being the native and foreign princes and nobles, as well as the members of the newly appointed American commissionaires actively working to get the U. S. department of the treasury to pay its debts.

LONDON, 3.—The Great Eastern Railway directors have decided to retire into the cities with their provisions, has caused great agitation, and brought forth places for them to be asked to revoke the order and thus remove cause for hostile demonstrations by the peasants.

ST. PETERSBURG, 3.—Fifty thousand rubles were given yesterday by the Emperor of Germany and the czar, and in the evening St. Petersburg was illuminated.

LONDON, 4.—The steamer Wilkes left for America on the 31st inst., to repair the broken cable, and will arrive in New York in five days. The steamer Albatross, bound for Placentia, Newfoundland, and Sydney, C. B. It is expected that four cables will be working across the Atlantic, and five across the gulf of St. Lawrence before next September.

CENTRAL AMERICA.

PANAMA, 24.—Affairs in Panama have subsided into a state of apparent tranquility. The state troops still keep under arms and will, it is said, remain so until it is known whether the French cabinet has accepted changes of government that has taken place. It is not likely how long the French army will persist in assistance to this coup d'etat, and negotiations will probably go on to the satisfaction of the liberals.

Reports from San Salvador with respect to the earthquake which shook the city, state that shocks continued during the day, and that the government palace, which survived the shock which laid the city in ruins, has also given way and fallen to the ground. A great many people had been injured and many had lost their reason. It was doubtful whether the authorities will persist in their determination to rebuild the capital on the same site.

NICARAGUA.—Information up to date shows that our men going to show the U. S. exploring expedition, having finished a minute survey of Lake Managua, are now occupied in determining the capabilities of the San Juan River. All the necessary measurements, surveys and calculations have been completed, and the report will be ready in two or three weeks. The results of which were satisfactory.
