

DEATHS.

EDMONDS—Monday morning, August 18, of teething and dropsy of the brain, John Le Roy, son of Robert and Harriet Edmonds, aged 1 year and 17 days.

The funeral services were held this afternoon.

STANDIFORD—At Taylor, Apache County, Arizona, August 6th, 1884, at 8 p.m., of dropsy, Catharine, daughter of John H. and Mary Argyle Standiford. Born December 3rd, 1869. Kind, affectionate, and beloved by all her associates, her death is deeply lamented.

Deceased was born in Macon County, Illinois; emigrated to Utah in 1847; was among the first settlers of Salt Lake City. Neph and Moroni, having shared in the vicissitudes of Indian troubles and other trials incident to pioneer life in Utah. She was the mother of ten children, nine of whom are left to mourn the loss of one of the best of mothers, whose kindness of heart and motherly care will ever be fresh in their memories and in the memories of all who knew her. She had a strong desire to live to labor in a Temple of the Lord for the benefit of the living and the dead. She died strong in the faith of the Gospel and in hopes of joining in the resurrection of the just. Her death cast a gloom over the whole city, and the high esteem in which she was held induced the largest assembly at the funeral that has been witnessed at any such gathering in our city. May she rest in peace. —COM.

THOMAS—In Spanish Fork, Utah County, August 10th, 1884, of heart disease, Mary Ann Thomas, wife of Rowland Thomas, and daughter of Albert and Sarah Unger. She was born May 4, 1848, at Swansea, Glamorganshire, South Wales. She was baptized when eight years old in her native town, by Elder Elias Morris; and emigrated to Utah in 1860. Preceding her parents in gathering to Zion, she lived with the family of Fernamor Little; was a member of the Tabernacle Choir from her arrival in the valleys until her removal to Spanish Fork in 1871, when she joined the choir at that place. She was the mother of ten children, eight of whom are living. She was a faithful wife, an affectionate mother and a true Latter-day Saint, and was beloved by all who knew her.

BUCHANAN—At Mantli, Utah, August 17, 1884, at the residence of her son, Brother John Buchanan, of extreme old age, Sister Nancy Bach Buchanan, born in Mercer County, Ky., Feb. 25, 1790, and was consequently 94 years, 5 months and 22 days old. She was of German extraction as her maiden name indicates, and was married to John Buchanan in 1812, emigrated in 1830 to Illinois, where she first heard the Gospel. She was baptized in the winter of 1835 and in 1837 she joined the Saints in Caldwell Co., Missouri, where she passed through the privations and hardships of the Saints there. In the winter of 1837-8 she was expelled from the State and returned to Quincy, Ill., and from thence to Lima in that State, where through disease brought on by exposure and hardship endured in Missouri, her husband died in 1839, leaving her with a family of eight children to provide for. In 1844 she was driven by mob violence from Lima to Nauvoo, where she remained until the spring of 1846, when she, with a large company of Saints took up the line of march for the great West. At Winter Quarters her son John, her only help, enlisted in the Mormon Battalion, and at the expiration of his term he returned to Winter Quarters, made arrangements, and started with his mother and the younger children across the plains. They reached Salt Lake Valley in 1853, and continued their journey to Sanpete Valley the same season, where they have continued to reside.

Sister Buchanan knew but little of the pleasures of this life until her arrival here since which time, however, she has enjoyed peace and happiness in the bosom of her son's household, where all that loving hearts and willing hands could do to render her comfortable and happy was done. She retained her mental powers to the last moment, and was an untiring and uncompromising Latter-day Saint. In all her persecutions and trials she never faltered nor wavered for a moment, but died as she had lived—full of love for the gospel, and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. —COM.
