FLOATING FRAGMENTS.

Bright, clear, bracing and beautiful day.

Morgan State Quarterly Conference to-day and to-morrow.

W. C. Remar, an old citizen, died in the 14th Ward, at 5 a.m. to-day.

Apostle John Henry Smith is again in town. His brother Charles, at Provo, has made a turn for the better and is recovering.

November is becoming the coldest month in the year. The mercury was away down last year at this time—so it is this year.

Last Thursday Foley Abbott saw 55 deer in three bands within five miles of Bellevue, Idaho. He shot three in slight of town, on Snow-Shoe Hill.

On and after January 1st, 18-2, the rate of interest that will be paid by Zion's Savings Bank and Trust Company on all deposits will be five per cent.

It is claimed that there is a mountain of copper and iron ore in the district east of Lovelock's Station, Nevada, which has not yet been much prospected.

Brother Robert Pixon, a survivor of the Mormon Battalion, and who passed through the memorable Mexican campaign, is dangerously ill, at his residence in West Jordan.

A letter from Elder W. M. Bromley, President of the New Zealand mission, to Brother Ferguson, of this city, reports him in good health, and the work under his watchcare progressing favorably.

The first party of the series, to take place in the Twelfth Ward Assembly Rooms, comes off on Wednesday evening, November 23. Holders of tickets will please govern themselves accordingly.

Prehistoric remains have been found near Fort McDowell, Arizona. There are mounds, stone walls, utensils, pottery and rude paintings of beasts of burden and of a very large animal resembling the mastodon.

A gentleman has informed us that we must have been thinking of him when we described the perpetually busy man. His wife thought so too. We think he answers the description capitally, but so do lots of others.

The Oxford Enterprise says: Bears must be getting tame and hungry about Clifton. We learn from Mr. Henry Dixon, that one brute with more recklessness than discretion, was foraging around Mr. C. W. Howell's door-yard after dark.

The line of survey of the Northern Pacific shows Helena, Montana, to be 476 miles nearer to Chicago by that route than by the Utah and Northern and Union Pacific, the respective distances being as follows: Via Northern Pacific, 1,557 miles; via Union Pacific, 2,033 miles.—Ogden Herald.

About two o'clock Wednesday morning, at Lordsburg, New Mexico, over a dozen masked men came to the Old Shakespere Jail, where two cow-boys, known as Bill Littenbern, alias "Russia Bill," and Sandy King, were confined, and seizing the guard, hanged the two unhappy men to a post until dead.

The Humboldt Indians are now living on the fat of the land. The flock of the Humboldt is alive with ducks, geese, swans and other edible water fowl. The Indians spend most of their time, when not engaged in gambling and sleeping, hunting these fowls. They have 50 tale boats on different parts of the lake.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Missionaries.—Home missionaries will visit the city wards to-morrow evening.

General Services.—Religious services in the Assembly Hall, beginning at 2 p.m., to-morrow.

Reached Orderville.—President Taylor and party reached Orderville, Kane County, yesterday afternoon. All were well.

Convicted and Sentenced.—A short time since, the News published the fact that John Maguire, a mail agent on the Central Pacific R. R., had been arrested for opening letters and purloining money from them. He has been convicted of the crime and sentenced to two years' imprisonment in the California State prison.

Prodigious Yield.—We have seen a large number of notices in our exchanges of enormous yields of potatoes to the acre. We learn from Brother Harvey H. Perkins, of a yield that surpasses everything of the kind we have ever heard of. We doubt if it has ever been exceeded in the history of potato cultivation. On a farm owned by H. H. Perkins and Esther Coffin, and cultivated by M. Mabey, one acre gave a product of 1,776 bushels of fine large Early Rose tubers. In order that there might be no mistake in the matter, the ground and potatoes were measured by four men. Who can beat that?

The ordinary yield at Wood's Cross or Bountiful, this year, on good soil, was about 600 bushels to the acre.

Two Marriages in One Family.—A somewhat unusual circumstance occurred, on Thursday, in the family of Brother John Almet and wife, of the 20th Ward. Two of their daughters were married. Miss Elizabeth Almet, the eldest daughter, was united to Brother John Dick, late of Tooele, but now of this city, and Miss Susan, the next, was tied by the nuptial knot, to Brother Alexander Winward, of South Jordan. The ceremonies were performed at the Endowment House in this city. On Thursday evening there was a social gathering at the residence of the parents of the two blooming brides, when no less than sixty guests sat down to supper. Good feelings and congratulations were the order of the day. We mingle our best wishes with those of the friends of all the parties.

From North Carolina.—Yesterday we were pleased to meet Elder James H. Moyle, of the 15th Ward, just returned from a mission to the Southern States. He left this city for the field to which he was appointed, on the 1st of July, 1879. He was assigned by President John Morgan to labor in North Carolina. It was hard work to make openings for the gospel in that part of the country at first. In February 1880, President Morgan organized that section into a conference, and appointed Elder Moyle to preside over it. The value of organization became at once apparent, as the work began to prosper more abundantly, and has continued to do so to the present. Elder Moyle visited and traveled in twenty-one counties in North Carolina, and five in Virginia, opening new fields for the Elders laboring in connection with him. He baptized seventeen persons during his mission. Last June he and the brethren with him were challenged to a discussion by some Baptist ministers. The challenge was accepted and the Elders were on the spot at the appointed time, but their polemic opponents failed to put in an appearance. Threats of mobbing were made occasionally, but were never carried out. The people of that part of the country are represented by Elder Moyle as generally kind and hospitable. When he went there he found but two Elders in the field, and now there are fourteen. Elder Geo. Passey, of Bear Lake Valley, has been appointed to succeed Elder Moyle as president of the North Carolina Conference.

A Belligerent German.—The Butte Miner, of Wednesday, gives an account of some outrageous pranks played at Silver Bow, on the Utah & Northern R. R. by a German named John Gorman.

Going into the saloon of John White, he kicked over a pan of hot water on the stove, and made free with the premises generally. White came up and remonstrated with him with a chair, knocking him down twice, but the untamed terror of the west would not yield to such persuasion, and ran White out of his saloon, smashing every glass, window pane and tangible article on the premises. While summoning assistance, the citizens turned out, and after a hard struggle, bound the walking tornado with strong cords, and thus prevailed on him to stop his mischief. About half-past eight at night, however, he again broke loose, but was arrested by a Butte constable. On the way to Butte, just the other side of the Dexter mill, German drew a knife, cut the officer in the left breast—the blade glancing from a suspender buckle and thus probably saving his life. After attempting other out, he was finally quieted with an application of a pistol butt to his cranium.

The "Exponent."—We have received the Woman's Exponent for November 15th. It opens with a selected poem, "Mary Queen of Scots," which is very beautifully written; there is a very interesting correspondence from Dr. Ellen B. Ferguson; a Life Sketch of Zina D. H. Young; No Black for Me, by Gella; Music, by Beatrice; Woman suffrage in Utah, editorial; Local Intelligence; Relief Society News; Scenes and Incidents in Nauvoo; Ellen M. Whitney; Jokers and Joking, a forcibly written article. There are other articles, the whole constituting a very acceptable number. The popularity of this excellent periodical is justly increasing.

Church and School Statistics.—Secretary Thomas has taken great pains to make the church and school statistical report from Utah as complete as possible. His correspondence on the subject has been very extensive, he having written no less than 2,000 letters to different parties in relation to it. Where he has not been able to obtain the desired information by other means he has visited different parts of the Territory personally. The result is very satisfactory, as the report from Utah will probably be as complete as any of the States and Territories. It will soon be ready to forward to Washington.

Death of a Respected Lady.—We regret to learn that Mrs. Rhoda Richards, of Farmington, wife of Apostle F. D. Richards, died at her residence, either last night or early this morning. The deceased was an invalid for a long time prior to her demise.

We have learned since the above was in type that deceased expired at one a.m., to-day. She was formerly the wife of the late President Willard Richards. Her own family name is Foss.

Two of Them.—Shortly before seven o'clock considerable commotion was caused in the family of Brother David P. Rich, of the 19th Ward, son of Apostle C. C. Rich. The cause of the excitement was twins, both boys. Mrs. Rich, who is a daughter of the late President Heber C. Kimball, and twin sister of Andrew Kimball of this city, is getting along nicely. There is joy in that household. Good luck to the boys.

Hurt About the Head.—The Ogden Herald says that: "Mr. Peter McFarlane, June, a young man about 22 years of age, brakeman on the C. P. R. R., met with a serious accident at Peapack, Nev., about two o'clock p.m. on Thursday. Mr. McFarlane left Ogden on Wednesday and when the train neared Peapack, he got on the top of a car to put down a brake, just previous to entering a snow shed. He was on the forward car, and the time prevented him from seeing the proximity to the shed, one of the timbers of which came in contact with his head, knocking him down to the top of the car, where he remained senseless for some time. The train traveled about six miles before he was missed and discovered by the engineer. He was covered by the caboose, and on arriving at Wells, his wounds were dressed. He was placed on the east bound express train and arrived home this morning. He has an ugly wound on the left side of his head, and the left side of his face and left ear are terribly lacerated. It is thought he will recover in a few weeks."

Beautiful farms have sprung up, and fields of wheat, oats and barley and hundreds of thousands of cattle are now to be found, where only two or three years ago was the land of the Indian and the buffalo.
