DEATH OF LEANDER' LEMMON Pioneer and Colonizer Closes Streauous Career at 68.

Huntington, Emery Co., Oct, 2,—Leander Lemmon, one of the early settlers of Utah, died at his home in this city on Friday, Oct, 4, of cancer of the stemach. Mr. Lemmon was born Nov. 16, 1839, in Illinois near Nauvon, and came to Utah with his parents in 1852. He was one of a family of 12 children, and the son of Washington and Tamer Lemmon. His father was 96 years and his mother was 87 when they died. When his parents came to Utah, they settled in Mil Creek, Sait Lake county and lived there all their lives. Lee, as he was known among his friends, was a true pioneer, He went when a hog with a company of men in 1857 to Echo canyon, and spent several months with the Utah army there. In 1866 he went with a pioneer company to help settle Cache valley. While on a visit to his home on Mili Creek in the spring of 1862, he joined Lot Smith's company and helped to Special Correspondence
