London, Feb. 19 .-- The agitation on the subject of American inroads upon British trade seems likely to result in an interesting economic and labor experiment under the leadership of John Lockie, late conservative parliamentary candidate for Devon Park.

### SPOONER AMENDMENT.

Washington, Feb. 19 .- The sub-committee of the Senate committee on military affairs, having in charge the army appropriation bill, has agreed to add to the bill Senator Spooner's amendment providing for a civil government in the Philippine archipelago. The committee will restore the word "judicial," elim. inated from the amendment by the Philippine commission, thus giving the President explicit authority over the judicial branch of the government.
