

In a Number of Instances Troops Were Defeated and Forced To Surrender.

NORTH CAUCASIAN REPUBLIC.

Had a Short and Thrilling History-Had an Army Which Campaigned Successfully.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 28 .- The newspapers publish interesting accounts received by mail of the disorders in the smaller cities of the interior during the period of armed revolt, many of which passed unnoticed at the time owing to the interruption of telegraphic . communication. In a number of instances the troops were defeated and driven out of the towns or forced to surrender.

Sotssi, on the Black sea, 80 Cossacks of the garrison who attempt-ed to disperse u gathering in the mared to disperse a gathering in the mar-ket place were routed by the revolu-tionists and forced to flee to their bar-racks outside the town, where they were regularly besieged. The insur-gents brought up an old cannon from the port and bombarded the barracks for two days with such effect that the Cossacks were forced to surrender.

The triumph of the revolution is was short-lived, however, for a torpe-do-boat destroyer arrived from Baioum and the population, at the first threat of a bombardment, hastened to liber-ate the prisoners and to deliver up their arms, as well as the funds of the city treasury, which had been taken to the mountains. A letter from Pyatigorsk, in Ciscau-casia, describes the rise and fall of the North Caucasian republic, which had a short and thrilling history of a month. This "army" carried on a successful campaign against the troops guard-ing the railroad stations who were driv-Ing the railroad stations who were driv-en back for some 40 miles along the line with considerable loss. The revo-lutionists conceived the plan of march-ing to Rostoff-on-Don, 250 miles away, and even talked of continuing on to Kharkoff to join hands with the sup-posed revolutionary army there. They were to stop on the way and attack the important arsenal at Georgievsk, where there are large stores of rifles, cannon and machine guns.

cannon and machine guns. The army was attacked by three companies of Cossack whom it defeated with heavy loss, most of the survivors being killed during their flight across

the thin ice of a stream. Later the "army" encountered a col-umn of infantry, a battery of artillery and several companies of Cossacks. This column was too strong to be resisted, and the revolutionists, after a hasty council of war, fied. The "re-public" then came to an end. Goldfield, Nev., Jan. 27.—Jack Gineau lies dead in the morgue at Ton-onah tonight, and George Cole, a member of the legislature from Nye county, is shot through the arm as a result of a pitched battle between union and non-union miners at Cliffords, io miles from Stone Cabin, on the Manhattan road.

Sheriff Tom Logan late this evening placed eight non-union men, who are charged with precipitating the trouble, under arrest and brought them to Tonopah tonight under a strong guard to prevent bynching

to prevent lynching. As soon as the news of the shooting reached Goldfield, Sheriff Bud Cay-berry assembled a posse to go to the scene of the trouble to arrest the murderers.

derers, George Cole, who was for years pres-ident of the De Lamar Mingrs' union, with a committee of Miners' union men, went to Cliffords, the scene of a strike, to interview miners charged with working for less than \$5, the scale. A man named Elimiss is said to have opened fire, shooting Cole through the arm and Gineau through the lungs. A pitched hand-to-hand battle ensued, which concluded with the scape of the mon-union men, who for a time defied non-union men, who for a time defied the citizens' posse.
