LOCAL BRIEFS.

Volunteers Concert—The Volunteers of America will give a concert in the First Presbyterian church, April 7, to raise funds for the volunteer work.

Class to Entertain—The graduating class of St. Ann's academy will give an entertainment next Thursday afternoon, with Shakespeare as the basis of the program.

Returns from East—Oscar Groshell has returned from a month's trip to the east, with a better opinion than ever of Salt Lake, as compared with eastern conditions.

All Hallows Entertainment—The All Hallows students have arranged for an entertainment to be given on the evening of Tuesday next, St. Patrick's day. A good program is assured.

Rev. Spurgeon's Lecture—Rev. Dr. William Spurgeon, the English revivalist, lectured last evening in the First Presbyterian church on the religious revival which swept over Wales in 1859.

Leaves for Washington—Chief Inspector R. E. Benedict of the fire department will leave tomorrow for Washington, to attend a meeting of the chief inspectors from all over the west, with bureau chiefs.

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PIT AND BURIDGE STILL ON THE JOB

City Council Takes No Action as to Heads of Police Department.

MAYOR HAD NOT REPORTED.

License of "Nice and Easy" Saloon Revoked—Theater Ordinance Passed—Park Policemen.

No action was taken on police matters by the city council last night. It was expected that there would be something doing of an interesting character relative to the two principals of the department before the council adjourned, but the fact that Mayor Brannford has not reported from his California trip was doubtless responsible for postponement of action.

It had been whispered that Chief of Police Tom Pitt would be removed, while it was spoken right out loud that Capt. J. B. Burbridge would be demoted. It is desired by persons in the city to see Burbridge ousted because he is not a member of that party, and Mr. Pitt must go because he is disagreeable to the powers that be.

Many matters of routine were passed upon by the council. First came the "filing" of a bunch of applications from clerks and other employees of the city for an increase of pay. The action was equal to a denial of the requests.

Upon recommendation of Chief Pitt, the license of the "Nice and Easy" saloon at 150 north Third West street was revoked, because the proprietor permitted minors to lounge about his place. The chief presented the names of Nicholas Rydovick, Henry P. Heath and R. L. Patterson to act as special policemen, at the request of the park commission.

Approval was made of the contract of the Utah Light & Railway company for furnishing 600 arc lights for a period of three years, at \$5.00 per month. The ordinance providing for safety in theaters and other public buildings was passed.

Notices of the meeting of the board of equalization will hereafter be published but once, instead of five times, the council having passed Mr. Hall's resolution to that effect. The action of the council, advising the paving of a street, from First to Fourth avenue, with asphaltum, was rescinded, and Acting Mayor Perry vetoed the resolution of the council granting permission to J. P. Mahan to construct sidewalk for a distance of 80 feet on Eighth South.

Contracts with Frank Doran for sidewalk extensions No. 92, 95 and 86 were approved, calling for \$14,504.71. To the city engineer, was submitted a protest of the Salt Lake Brewing company against the proposed increase in water rates.

PLEASSED WITH GAS. After the council adjourned the members went to Second South and Second East streets to inspect the new installation of Welsbach incandescent street lamps, provided by the Utah Gas & Coke company. The party was accompanied by the city engineer, and the visitors were much impressed with the showing made.

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FACE CHARGE OF MANSLAUGHTER

Rio Grande Watchman Must Answer for Killing of Mat Zoraf.

AUSTRIAN DIES AT HOSPITAL.

In Ante-Mortem Statement Victim Says Was Shot in Back While Running—Cochrane Denies.

Watchman Maas Cochrane of the Rio Grande railroad, who shot Mat Zoraf, an Austrian, in the back while he was running after being detected in the act of stealing coal, will face a charge of voluntary manslaughter.

Cochrane is now under arrest and is at liberty on bail of \$500. He will go before Justice of the Peace Williams at Bingham Junction this afternoon or tomorrow, and the ball will probably be increased after the filing of the charge of manslaughter.

This charge grows out of the fact that Zoraf died Monday at the Holy Cross hospital, after lingering in a serious condition since Feb. 25. Before passing away Zoraf made an ante-mortem statement in which he said that he was freighting and went with a companion to the yards, where he picked up scattered coal off the ground. After being frightened away by the watchman, Zoraf received a wound in the back from his revolver which paralyzed him. Before death he recovered the use of the upper portion of his body, but not the lower portion.

COCHRANE'S VERSION. Cochrane made a statement to Justice of the Peace Williams to the effect that he crawled under a car where Zoraf was working, and that he was assaulted and kicked, and then shot at his assailant in self-defense. Zoraf contradicted this, declaring that he was shot from behind while running away from the orders to halt were issued, or if issued were simultaneous with the firing of the gun.
